**Twenty-nine Years Old.**  
With this issue The Tribune completes its twenty-ninth year. For six years it was published but once a week, the remainder of the time twice a week. The present publisher and Frank Boyer set the type for the initial issue January 24, 1881, and the publisher set this item on the linotype for this issue. In fact of the 2612 issues of the paper the publisher has done more or less mechanical work on each issue with perhaps the exception of forty-five or fifty, and today to him there is more real pleasure in composing an ad or setting a press than sitting in the U. S. land office with his feet cocked up on the desk waiting for business to show up. The publisher is wedded to The Tribune and the printing business, and seventy-five days hence when he steps out of the land office and devotes his entire time to the paper, the sweetest music on earth to him will be the whirr of the presses, the hum of the motors and the click of the linotype.

**Officers of Poultry Association.**  
At a recent meeting of the Lincoln County Poultry & Pet Stock association the officers, directors and committee for the coming year were elected. The names of the officers were published in a previous issue but at that time the board of directors and the committee was not complete.

The association will hold another meeting in the near future for the purpose of transacting some routine business and making more plans for the poultry and pet stock show next year. The success of the show this year was such that they are much encouraged over the next year's prospects. The show next year will undoubtedly far exceed the first one.

**Fully Thirty Thousand Dead.**  
The latest estimate of the number killed in the earthquake in Italy last week is 30,000, with an injured list of double that number.

All Italy has turned its attention to the work of rescue and relief. Thousands of soldiers and volunteers are digging frantically in the ruins in the hope that they may release a few who are still alive. Hundreds of bodies are being recovered, but first attention is given where it is believed there is a possibility the occupants of the ruined dwellings may not yet have perished.

## Irrigation Committee Meets Here.

A meeting of the legislative committee of the Nebraska irrigation association was held Friday afternoon in the office of J. G. Beeler in this city. All members of the committee were present and much business of interest transacted. J. T. Mitchell, of Mitchell, president of the association met with the committee. The purpose of the meeting was to draft bills for legislative enactment in conformity with the resolutions which were passed at the recent meeting of the association. The bills were drafted and have been sent to Senator Bushee to be introduced in the legislature.

The most important of the bills that were drafted was one providing for the appropriation of \$25,000 for the purpose of carrying on the litigation of the association to determine the priority rights of appropriation of waters in inter-state streams regardless of state boundary lines. This bill is one that is of intense interest to all irrigators as well as to all Nebraskans. Much controversy has recently arisen regarding the rights to the use of the water in the Platte rivers.

Contrary to current reports this meeting had no bearing on the few differences that came up in the state meeting. It was merely a litigation meeting and was in the interests of the Nebraska association. It was for only the members of the committee and was to transact their regular business.

Regarding the one time feared of split in the association, it is now deemed very inadvisable and against the interests of Nebraska irrigators and Nebraskans.

## L. B. Dick is Honored by Lumbermen.

L. B. Dick, of this city, was last week elected a member of the board of directors of the Nebraska Lumbermen's association which met in Omaha. Mr. Dick has been an active member of that association and the honor conferred upon him is one of due merit.

Mr. Whitehead, of Mitchell, Neb., president of the Nebraska irrigation association, was in town Friday attending a meeting of one of the committees.

## NEIGHBORHOOD NEWS.

The suit brought by the Kratz-Craig Construction Co. against the town of Cozad to collect \$7,290 alleged to be due for the construction of a water plant, was decided in the district court at Lexington last week by the plaintiff company receiving a judgment of \$3,689.70.

The bank of Keystone is completing a new building which it will formally occupy next Saturday.

E. D. Wilbur and Theo. Reimers, of Big Springs, shipped eleven cars of cattle last week to Fullerton where they will be corn fed.

A Rebekah degreee lodge was organized at Maywood last week with twenty-six charter members.

The Revenna Creamery Co. has increased its capital stock from \$50,000 to \$75,000.

There were 14 divorces granted in Buffalo county during the year 1914, as against 40 during 1913.

A hog belonging to W. T. Headley, of Ryno, went crazy one day last week and killed a valuable calf, after which it attacked a colt and injured it.

After acting as police judge for 15 years, Charles Rilly gave up his position at Kearney last week at the age of 84 years, and at once departed for California, where he expects to reside in the future.

Casper Zierlein was arrested and brought back from Caldwell, Idaho, and placed in the jail at Broken Bow to await trial on the charge of seduction, the other party being Anna Neve, deaf and dumb girl residing on the West side.

## COUNTY NEWS.

From the Brady Vindicator it is learned that during 1914 there were shipped out of the Brady station 438 cars of farm products. Among the shipments were 258 cars of hay, ninety-two cars of cattle, forty-three cars of hogs, twenty-one cars of wheat and ten cars of horses.

Mrs. J. W. Nelson, living south of Maxwell, died January 8th at the age of twenty-one, leaving a baby but two weeks old.

The Maxwell Telepost says: W. H. Plumer has leased all of his meadow to E. M. Leech, and Mr. Leech and his business associates will hereafter enter into the cattle and hay business on a larger scale. Mr. Plumer is now free to enjoy life abroad or at home as he chooses.

A Lovestadt, for many years a resident of Medicine precinct, sold his personal property last week and will soon leave for California to visit his five children, who live in the Sacramento valley.

John Kostik, of Wellfleet, was thrown from a horse last week and badly bruised.

A grape vine message from Wellfleet gives the arrival of a nine pound boy to Mr. and Mrs. Joe McMichael, and a nine and three-quarter pound boy to Mr. and Mrs. George Young. Both men will recover.

W. H. Jenkins had a narrow escape Tuesday from serious accident. In starting a gasoline engine at his place for a balling outfit his coat, of heavy duck, became caught in the clutch and was pulling him into the machine when two of the helpers grabbed him and succeeded in getting him loose, but not, however, until the entire half of the heavy duck coat was torn from him. He was considerably bruised about the right arm and head and at this writing pretty much the worse for wear. Luckily no bones were broken.—Hershey Times.

## No American Exports to Germany.

The monthly summary issued by the department of commerce shows that a year ago in November Germany got from United States wheat to the value of \$336,208, while last November it got no wheat at all from us. During this month of November, while Germany was unable to get American wheat, Great Britain got \$7,309,303 worth from us.

Belgium, as well as Germany, got no wheat from America in November. France, in November, 1913, got wheat to the amount of \$383,641 from America, in November, 1914, it got \$2,898,933 worth from us.

Italy, though not engaged in the war, took an enormous quantity of our wheat as compared to November a year ago. The figures are: November, 1913, \$429,181; November, 1914, \$4,363,864.

## No Passengers Killed Last Year.

According to the report of the Safety First department, during 1914 no passengers were killed while riding on the Union Pacific, whereas, during 1913 thirteen persons lost their lives. During 1913, 326 passengers were injured and in 1914 the number dropped off to 234.

In 1913 sixty-four employees of the road were killed and 6,128 injured. In 1914 the fatalities were twenty-four, with 4,963 injured.

Trespassers and travelers on the right-of-way and on highways crossing the tracks fared worse during 1914 than during 1913. Last year of these seventeen were killed and ninety injured, whereas during 1913 but eight were killed and eighty-five injured.

## Seek to Recover Threshing Outfit.

Suit was filed Friday in the district court by the J. I. Case Threshing Machine Co. against George Garman for the recovery of a threshing outfit and for damages. The amount due as claimed by the company is \$2,097.75, together with fifty dollars damages. The company claims that Garman refuses to pay the notes given and which are now past due.
