The Governor's Latest Joke. The latest joke perpetrated on the people of Nebraska by Governor Morehead is the appointment of A. M. Morrissey to be chief justice of the su-preme court. Morrissey is a young chap who has no reputation as lawyer, never sat on the judicial bench, and only came into prominence as the private secretary to the governor, which to say the most is a lackey's job. In order to appoint Morrissey the governor turned down a number of judges and lawyers who are among the most able men of the state; among these being Judge Westover, Judge Killiger, Judge Oldham, W. H. Thompson, John J. Halligan and others equally prominent. Tunnel Work to be Resumed.

The Kilpatricks, contractors on the Guernsey tunnel line, will resume work on the construction of that piece of railroad February 1, and it is now expected that work will continue without interruption until the nine miles of road, with more than a mile of tunnel, is ready for service. One of these tunnels is 3,500 feet in length, another 1,600 feet in length, and the other more than 1,000 feet in length. The road when completed will com-plete the Nebraska system with the new low grade line through Wyoming.

Work was stopped on this line last fall when the war tied up the financial resources of the world. The contractors were permitted to close the work so that resumption will not be a lang-drawn out task.
