"Whereas, O. E. Elder, F. W. Herminghausen and Victor Von Goetz, appraisers appointed and duly qualified for the purpose of assessing damages and costs of condemnation, in the matter of appropriating private property for street purposes within the City of North Platte, Nebraska, as provided in Ordinance No. 53, duly passed and approved, have made report of their doings and said appraisal is before the Council for action.


