Republicans Nominate Ticket.

A mass convention of the republicans of the city was held at the court house Saturday evening with an attendance of about two hundred. W. T. Wilcox, as chairman of the republican city committee, called the convention to order and presided during the evening. In his opening remarks he said that citizens generally were in favor of a cleaner town morally, complimented County Gibbs for running the "rabbits" off the island, but thought they, the "rabbits", should not be allowed to infest the city. The saloons of the city, he thought, were run about as decently as such places could be conducted, and gave the owners credit for observing the eight o'clock closing law to the letter.

The secretary read the call for the convention, and nominations for mayor were declared in order. W. E. E. Shuman, in a three minute speech, extolling the fitness of Sanford Hartman presented that gentleman as a candidate and the nomination was promptly seconded. J. T. Keefe nominated the present incumbent, E. H. Evans, appealing to the convention to show appreciation of the good work of Mr. Evans by re-nominating him.

A ballot was ordered and the count showed one hundred votes for Evans and seventy-four for Hartman.

C. F. Temple and F. J. Diener were placed in nomination for the office of city clerk and the ballot resulted in 101 votes for Temple and sixty-eight for Diener.

Frank L. Mooney was nominated for city treasurer by acclamation. For water commissioner Hershey Welch and A. B. Hoagland were nominated. Welch received 118 votes and Hoagland fifty-four.

Dr. N. McCabe, O. E. Elder and Leslie Baskins were nominated by acclamation for members of the board of education, the former two for the three-year terms, the latter to fill a vacancy.

Nominations for councilmen were made by the delegates present from the several wards for their respective wards and were as follows:

First ward, L. F. Simon; Second ward, J. H. Van Cleave; Third ward, J. H. Stone; Fourth ward Victor Von-Goetz.

The ward committeemen selected were: First ward, T. M. Cohagen; Second ward, O. E. Eder; Third ward, Bruce Brown; Fourth J. E. Jeffries.

The city committee was empowered to fill any vacancies in the ticket should any exist, and the convention then adjourned.

O'Connell Taken to Lincoln

Maurice J. O'Connell, convicted in the district court of embezzlement and sentenced for one to ten years in the penitentiary, was taken to that institution Friday evening by Sheriff Salisbury. Following the conviction O'Connell took an appeal to the supreme court and furnished the necessary bond. Later the bond was surrendered and unable to secure other bondsmen, O'Connell was placed in jail. The law provides that a prisoner under sentence to the penitentiary can be kept in a county jail but thirty days and this thirty day period expired Friday, hence his removal to the penitentiary there to await the outcome of the appeal to the supreme court.

ONLY OVERWHELMING NUMBERS CAN CRASH TEUTONS.

The official military observer at the British headquarters in the field says in a report given out that there is no truth in statements that the German ranks in the west have been depleted generally and to a marked extent.

"The plain truth is that although the enemy's effectiveness in the west is much reduced and ours increased, he still is holding an enormous amount of front, as well as carrying out operations on a huge scale in the east," the report says. "No signs of weakening are yet visible in the morale of the German troops as a whole. There is as yet no reason why an intensely brave, determined and well-organized army like that of the Germans should feel discouraged.

"It is impossible to say that either the German people or the army have yet definitely lost confidence in their ultimate success. This confidence will be only overthrown and the morale of the troops will be shaken by the consciousness of crushing defeat in the field; but this end can only be attained by ever-increasing pressure of vast numbers of men and guns throughout the coming months.

"The Kaiser can choose at will a Russian, Belgian or French town wherein to make a triumphant appearance in the presence of his troops. They are fighting in the enemy's country, ruined and devastated by the passage of their armies."

The Wheat We have Left.

Responding to many inquiries from all parts of the country, the Department of Agriculture recently issued statements showing our supplies, consumption and export of wheat, the inquiries having been called forth by depletions of our supplies through heavy exportations. It is estimated by the department that in 1914 the total amount of wheat produced in this country and brought over from the previous year was 967,000,000 bushels of which 520,000,000 bushels were required for home consumption and 90,000,000 for seedling. These figures left a surplus of 357,000,000 bushels of which up to February of this year 210,000,000 bushels had been exported, leaving for export between February and July (when the new crop begins to appear) 147,000,000 bushels. That amount would permit of exports daily until July of about 1,000,000 bushels, but it would leave no stock to carry over into the new year.—Literary Digest.

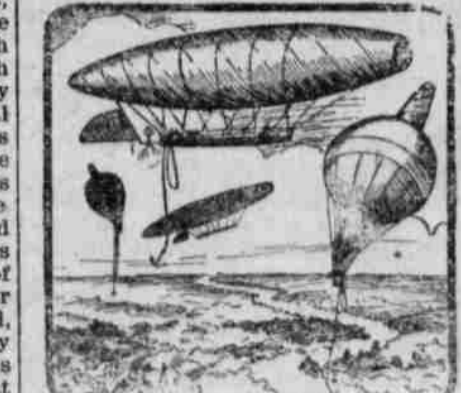
