# The Wheat We have Left.

Responding to many inquiries from all parts of the country, the Depart-Come and see us for town lots in ment of Agricuture recently issaued statements showing our supplies consumption, and export of wheat, the inquiries having beeen called forth heavy exportations. It is estimated by the department that in 1914 the total amount of wheat produced in this country and brought over from the previous year was 967,000,000 bushels of which 520,000,000 bushels were required for home consumption and Tablets for disorders of the stomach 90,000,000 for seeding. These figures and liver off and on for the past five left a surpus of 357,000,000 bushels of which up to February of this year 210,000,000 bushels had been exported, leaving for export between February just as represented.
