Lincoln Highway in Motion Pictures.
H. C. Osterman, of New York City, consul-at-large of the Lincoln Highway, spent Saturday afternoon in town and was in conference with T. C. Patterson, who is consul for Lincoln county. Mr. Osterman will return tomorrow and will meet with the Chamber of Commerce and take up the matter of having North Platte "featured" in a motion picture film that will show every foot of the Lincoln highway from New York to San Francisco.

In order to obtain this picture film Mr. Osterman, accompanied by an expert operator, will leave New York April 25th and drive an auto over the 3384 miles, and as the car moves along every foot of the highway will be taken. To make this trip will require ninety days. In each state certain towns on the highway will be featured. Those selected in Nebraska will be Omaha, Fremont, Grand Island and North Platte. However, in order to be "featured" each town must pay a certain sum, the minimum charge being \$50 and the maximum \$300. These charges are to meet the expenses of making the film. Mr. Osterman's object in meeting with the Chamber of Commerce is to ascertain how much North Platte will contribute.

These films will be shown at picture shows the country over and if North Platte is "featured" the existence of the town will be known in every city and village in the United States.

The deceased had practiced in Ogalalla for eight years, and for three years prior had been located at Paxton. While a resident of the latter place he was married to a daughter of Mr. and Mrs. David Stafford, who survives him.

The remains were taken to Barnes, Ia., Sunday evening accompanied by the wife and Undertaker W. R. Maloney of this city. Dr. Lykens was a Mason, and also an Elk, and a delegation of the latter acted as an escort when the casket was taken to the depot.
