**EVANS RE-ELECTED;
PLURALITY OF 86**

**License Carries by Reduced
Majority over Last Year**

Contrary to general expectations, and despite the rainy weather, North Platte cast more than its normal vote at the city election Tuesday. The total vote cast was 1,080, which is about 250 below the full voting strength, but a larger vote than is usually cast at a city election. The fight, which was of the "gum shoe" variety, centered on mayor and the dry or wet proposition, and politics did not enter into the contest.

The total vote cast on the wet or dry proposition was 935, which shows that 145 of those who cast their ballots were indifferent as to whether the saloon existed and did not vote on the question. License received a vote of 510, while 425 voted against license. The vote by wards was as follows:

The vote in favor of saloons shows a decrease of forty-four votes as compared with 1914. In that year with a total vote of 1,032, the majority was 130, the First ward giving a majority of eighty-one for, the Second twenty-seven against, the Third thirty-six for and the Fourth forty for.

E. H. Evans was re-elected mayor by a majority of 86 over Hartman, the former receiving 522 votes and the latter 436. Duke, socialist candidate for mayor received about 100 votes.

For city clerk, C. E. Temple carried each of the four wards, and his majority over Diener was 324.

Board of Education—Dr. N. McCabe 701, O. E. Elder 833, L. C. Baskins 833, Mrs. Mary Axtell 254, Mrs. P. O. Deats 158, C. H. Wilson 150. A number of ladies voted for members of the school board.

F. L. Mooney for treasurer and Hershey Welch for water commissioner had no opposition.

Appoint Delegates to Encampment.

At a meeting of Harry E. Brown Camp, United Spanish War Veterans delegates to the state encampment, which meets April 26th and 27th in Omaha, were appointed. The local camp is doing its utmost to bring the encampment here for 1915. Three officers, Commander Leonard Robinson, Senior Vice-Commander S. T. Clark and Junior Vice-Commander W. J. House have votes in the state encampment and they have been assured that they will have the support of several other camps.

The local camp has been advised that all veterans of the Spanish-American war whether affiliated with any camp, will be welcome at the convention and are invited to attend. The local camp is the second largest in the state, Omaha leads and North Platte is second. Five members of the local camp live in Ogallala.

The following delegates were appointed to the state encampment: John McKeag of Ogallala, and A. E. Bell and A. W. Brown of this city. Alternates are O. E. Garrison, W. E. Scharmann and A. W. Shiffing. The three commanding officers are also delegates by virtue of their positions.

For the first time in eighteen years a republican was elected mayor of Chicago. His name is William H. Thompson and his plurality was only 139,624. Over 240,000 Chicago women voted at the election, and still some insist that women will not vote when given the opportunity.
