SPLENDID OPENING OF REVIVAL CAMPAIGN.

The large tabernacle which has been erected by the North Platte Evangelistic Association, an organization made up of men from the Methodist, Presbyterian, Baptist and Christian churches, was filled to the doors and many people standing outside for the opening services Sunday.

A rousing and spiritual song service was conducted by Prof. Moody, the music director of the company. He was aided by a large orchestra and a chorus of some 125 voices. Mr. LaViolette, the splendid accompanist of the party, presided at the Baby Grand piano which has been furnished for this occasion by the Langlois Piano company of our city. The singing of the good old gospel songs under such leadership, and with such accompaniment was an inspiration and revelation to all present. North Platte will be greatly blessed by such singing throughout the entire series of meetings.

Rev. Cram of the local Methodist church introduced Dr. Lowry the evangelist of the company, and in turn, Dr. Lowry introduced Mr. Moody, musical director, Mrs. Moody, special personal worker, Mr. Martin, the advance man, Mr. LaViolette, pianist and secretary, and Mr. Shober, personal worker and special preacher. The Chautauqua salute was given by the large congregation in honor of the company.

Dr. Lowry took for his text, the words found in 1st Peter 4:17-18 "For the time is come when judgment must begin at the house of God; and if it first begin at us, what shall the end be of them that obey not the gospel of God? And if the righteous scarcely be saved, where shall the un-Godly and the sinner appear?"

The message was largely for professed Christians. Dr. Lowry said that perhaps some would say he was rubbing the fur the wrong way, but in that event, he felt called upon to suggest that such a person turn the cat the other way around. He declared that judgment must begin at the pulpit. That preachers today too often fed their congregation on essayettes and sermons rather than talk to them and instruct them in the way of right living. Judgment must begin in the pew as well as in the pulpit. Too many professed Christians are not trying to do right. They wish to go where the crowd goes. The crowd is on the way to hell. The evangelist further declared that there are many in the churches who should be in the penitentiary, and that they would some day be in hell unless they change. The latter part of his message was devoted to the asking of soul-searching questions to Christians. Popular amusements and the many alluring and subtle forces which drag men to a low and un-useful profession of christianity were spoken of in no uncertain way.

Dr. Lowry is a forceful, eloquent preacher and one who believes in "scratching people where they itch the most." An estimate of 1800 people in attendance has been made by a number who were present. Every member of the company is a specialist and is strong in the line they represent. Services will be held every night in the week but Mondays. The public is cordially invited to attend, and it is hoped that the large tabernacle will be crowded nightly. The evening services begin at 7:30 sharp each evening.
