BILL OF EXCEPTIONS FILED IN THE ROBERTS CASE.

The bill of exceptions to taken before the supreme court of the state in the case of Roy Roberts, under death sentence for the murder of Vernon Cornett, was served on County Attorney Gibbs Saturday by Jas. F. Keefe, attorney for Roberts.

The bill of exceptions is a type written copy of all the testimony taken in the case, together with the exceptions taken by the defense and the rulings of the court. It consists of six hundred and six pages of type-written copy.

After the case is filed before the supreme court date for the hearing will be set. Unless the case is completed at an early date its pending will automatically postpone the date of execution. In case the supreme court finds for the defendant the case will be sent back here for re-trial. Should the court find against the defendant the date of the execution will be set by the governor.

Mrs. Smith Dead of Heart Trouble. Mrs. Rebecca Smith, wife of George H. Smith, passed away Friday night at her home at 616 south Pine street. Heart trouble was the cause of her death. She was sixty-two years, five months and twelve days of age at the time of her death. She had been a resident of this city for three years past, coming here from Stapleton.

Rebecca Garland was born November 18, 1852 in Barbersville, Ky. She lived there as a girl and later moved to Indiana where she was married May 4, 1873 to Geo. H. Smith. To this union were born nine children all of whom survive. In 1884 she came west with her husband and settled near Stapleton where they lived until three years ago when they moved to this city.

Those who survive Mrs. Smith, besides her many friends, are the husband and nine children. The children are Delsar Smith of Kearney, Mrs. Anna Willis of Stapleton, Mrs. Clyde Lake of this city, Lester Smith of Gandy, Mrs. Myrtle Meyers of Brady, Mrs. Gertrude Pender of Gandy, Mrs. May Clark of Maywood and Everett and Herbert who live at home.

The funeral was held yesterday morning at 11 o'clock at Gandy and interment was in the Gandy cemetery.

School Finances in Good Shape. The finances of the North Platte city school district are now in prosperous condition, states City Treasurer F. L. Mooney. Within the past few weeks ten thousand dollars of taxes due were paid into the school treasury, enabling the treasurer to pay off all outstanding warrants and still have a comfortable balance on hand. The payment of the money derived from the saloon licenses which were recently granted by the council helped considerably towards swelling the account. A short time ago the school board reported a rather depleted treasury on account of delay in payment of taxes.

Bernard Beer Passes Away. Bernard Beer, for twenty years a resident of Lincoln county, passed to the beyond Thursday of last week at his home in Detroit, Mich. The remains were taken to Denver and the funeral held Sunday.

The deceased came to Lincoln county in 1879 from Keith county where he had been associated with D. T. Rankin in the 7-bar ranch. He engaged in the cattle business with a ranch on the Medicine creek, and later made his home in the valley about six miles southwest of town. He moved to Denver in 1899 and a few years ago went to Detroit to make his home.

The deceased was a brother of Max Beer of this city.

Auto Licenses Must be Paid. County Treasurer Durbin has received the number plates from the state for the automobile owners. These plates will be given when the 1915 licenses are paid. Under the new law passed by the last legislature there is a fine imposed for non-payment of the automobile tax. The law was made to go into effect April 6th of this year. The license is three dollars unless the owner happens to be in arrears in which case it will be more than double that.

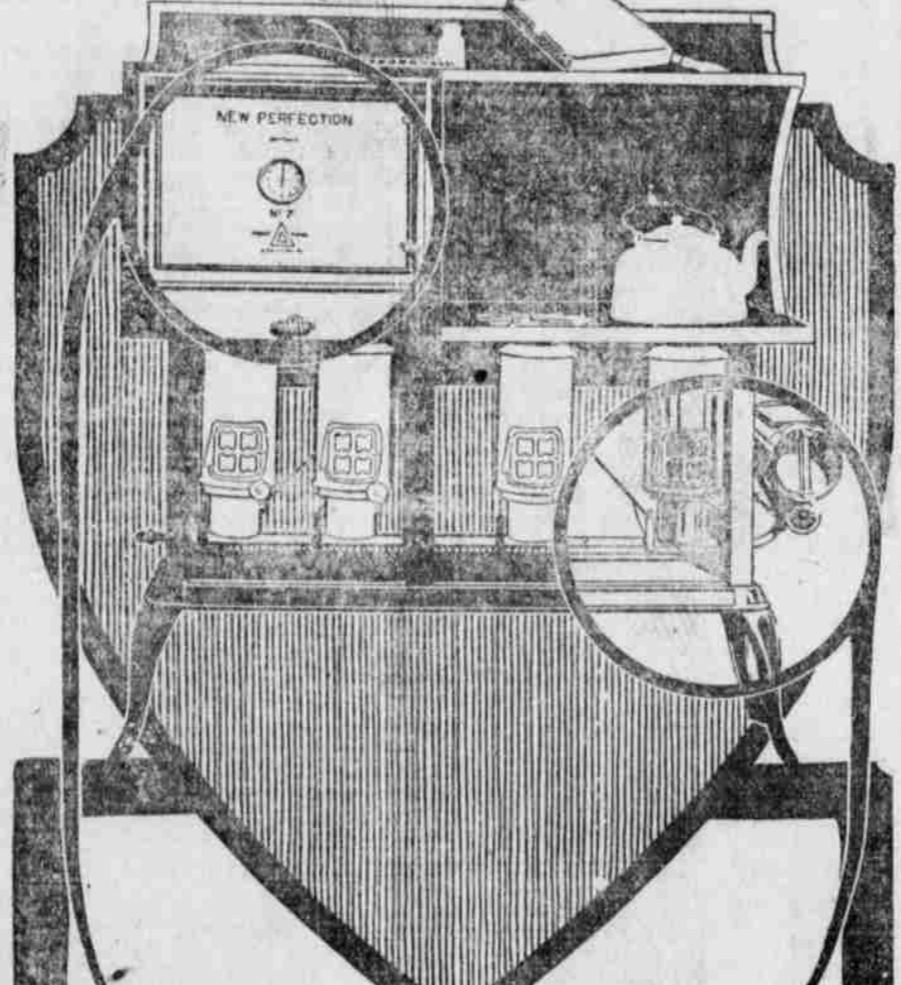
