LOCAL AND PERSONAL

Elsewhere, will be found official notices issued by City Clerk Temple relative to the assessments against city lots for the construction of sidewalks and for cutting weeds. Owners of property, including vacant lots, should not forget the fact that when they are directed to lay a walk and neglect to do so, the city builds the walk and assesses the cost against the property and this assessment becomes a part of the taxes, and is therefore a lien. The same is true when there is a non-compliance of an order to cut weeds. In addition to the cost of constructing the walk or cutting the weeds, the cost of advertising, which amounts to about forty cents per lot for weed cutting and a dollar or more for each sidewalk laid, is included in the cost and must be paid by the property owner. It will thus be seen that the wise man and the saving man will obey the mandates of the council and not permit the city to build walks and cut weeds for him.

C. J. Johnson, of Elm Creek, was instantly killed Tuesday evening by train No. 10. According to an eye witness to the accident Johnson was standing on the south side of the double tracks and watching a west bound freight train passing through. He failed to notice the fast coming passenger train and stepped directly in front of it. The body was hurled against the depot building and then rolled for several rods. Death was instantaneous, his skull having been crushed and his brains dashed out.

In the selection of officers the state convention of Elks held at Fremont this week two North Platte men were recognized. Ray C. Langford was elected first vice-president and J. B. McDonald a member of the executive board. Fred L. Harrison of Grand Island was elected president. The delegates and visiting Elks were royally entertained by the Fremont lodge. Entertaining features were a fish bake, cock fight, battle royal and other sports at the country club, and a banquet on the closing night.

The bright electric lights in the streets nightly attract thousands of June bugs who circle around the lights, evidently burn their wings and then drop to the ground. Fully a peck of these insects were swept from the pavement in front of the Keith theatre yesterday, where they had fallen the night before. The June bug is the propagator of the white grub which in years past proved destructive to lawns.

The first triennial convention of the Brotherhood of Locomotive Engineers opened in Cleveland Wednesday with 860 delegates present. W. L. Richards of this city representing the local division, is present. The ladies' auxiliary is holding a convention at the same time. SEVERAL CONVERTED IN TABERNACLE MEETINGS.

The first open gospel invitation was extended to men and women of North Platte in the Lowry-Moody union revival Tuesday night, and the front bench was filled with penitent souls who came to make their past right with God and to claim salvation in Jesus Christ.

Splendid congregational and chorus singing prepared the minds and hearts of the people for the searching message which Dr. Lowry gave Tuesday night. Prof. Moody used as his solo "Jesus is standing in Pilate's Hall." It was sung with telling effect.

Dr. Lowry read his scripture lesson from the 27th chapter of Matt, using the 22nd verse for his text. "What then shall I do with Jesus which is called Christ?"

In logical appeal and deep-searching picture after picture, the evangelist preached one of the greatest sermons ever heard in North Platte. Using the question of Pilate as a basis of his theme he spoke of the manner in which men today attempt to evade Jesus. The question was developed under the following headings: The words of the text contain an important question. In part the evangelist said, "There are many important questions in the world, but none so important as this one asked by Pilate. There have been great questions of tariff, of navy, of treasury, of finance, of protection, but these are nothing in comparison with the Governor's question. All great questions of our times—social, political, and theological lead to this question and they all find their solution in the answer to the inquiry 'What then shall I do with Jesus?' This is the pre-eminent question because it involves the pardon of sins and the preparation for eternal life."

"This question is a direct and personal one with you. It was a personal question to Pilate. It is no dry and withered question that concerns someone far away, or some one in past history, but it is a present and personal appeal to you and to me. It is personal to saint and sinner—to rich and poor—to learned and ignorant—to Christian and heathen."

"Some of you fellows think you need pay no attention to it at all. You say you are not against Christ if you never have declared yourself for Him, but you are mistaken for the Book, the last part of appeals, plainly says that the man who is not for Christ is against Him. That the one who does not gather with Him, scattereth abroad. You are either for or against Christ. What would you think of a young man proposing marriage to a young lady, who would be uncertain in his mind as to her meaning should she say, 'I cannot accept you, but I want you to know I will not reject you.' He would know what was meant and so would you. If you cannot accept Jesus then you do reject Him."

The question is a disturbing question. It gave so much trouble to the High priests that they assembled in their highest tribunals to discuss it. It troubled the Roman Governor. He tried hard to dodge the issue, and to evade answering the question. Pilate upon learning that Jesus was a Galilean sent him to Herod. But Herod could not decide the disturbing question, so he sent the Christ back to Pilate. The question has disturbed millions of men, and every conceivable excuse has been presented to evade answering it. The more guilty a man's conscience, the more troublesome is the question. You must give this question consideration, and you will decide even tonight for or against Jesus."

The question is a present question. It is imperative and demands an answer.

There is no neutral ground. There is no place to go where you can escape the question Pilate asked the Jews. In our scripture, Pilate judged Jesus who stood at his judgment bar; later on Pilate stood at the bar of King Jesus. This question will haunt you day and night. It will follow you in work, in pleasure, in sleepless nights, in the hours of lashing conscience. You may try to occupy Pilate's ground, but remember once and for all, there is no neutral ground. The soul must feed upon Christ, or it will meet with eternal death. The taxes must be paid or the property sold to pay them. This question is present with you tonight and it always will be. Today with Christ—Eternity with Christ. Today without Christ—Eternity without Christ.

"Upon a proper answering of this question depends your peace of conscience, your true joy in life—your freedom from sin and eventually your hope of eternal life. You must let Jesus into your heart or you are shutting him out. You are a creature of will power, and you can be saved. God has done His part. Christ has died for you and the Holy Spirit convicts you of your sins. You must do your part. It is up to you to yield to the King of Kings."

With splendid logic and irresistible appeal Dr. Lowry closed his sermon. The hearts of all rejoiced when several gave themselves to Jesus.

Revival Notes. There have been 23 converts in two nights of invitation at the big tabernacle. Others will follow. Visitors from neighboring towns have been in attendance at the meetings this week.

There will be a special children's meeting at 2:30 Saturday afternoon. It is hoped that the tabernacle will be sought by every boy and girl in and around North Platte. Also parents are welcome.

Meetings for men only and women only will be held next Sunday afternoon. Men will meet at the tabernacle where Dr. Lowry will speak on "Chickens Come Home to Roost." Women will meet at the Presbyterian church where Mrs. Moody will address the audience.

Those who have heard Dr. Lowry preach, are glad to speak of him as the most spiritual and powerful speaker they have been privileged to listen to. His mind is a storehouse of scripture, and verse after verse is quoted each night. If you have not heard him, a warm welcome awaits you at the tabernacle.
