COMMITTEE MAKES REPORT ON STREET LIGHTING.

E. R. Goodman, chairman of the special committee appointed to investigate street lighting conditions and recommend a tentative contract with the electric company, made a verbal report to the council at the meeting held Tuesday evening. The committee had investigated lighting plans and contracts in other towns and had held several conference with President Todd of the electric company.

Under the present statute the city is permitted to make a five mill levy for street lighting, which with our present assessed valuation would create a fund of \$3,961. This, therefore, limits us to a system not much better than we have at present, that is, so far as the number of lights are concerned. At present we are paying

The system now proposed is to dis-card the are lights, and substitute therefore fourteen incandescent lights of 250 candle power each. Seven of these lights would be located on Dew-cy street between Third and Front, three would be on the North side of the track, one at Fifth and Locust, one at Sixth and Locust, one at Front and Locust and one at Front and Pine.
