## PLANS FOR THE NEW HOTEL McCABE ACCEPTED

SPECIFICATIONS WILL BE READY IN A WEEK AND BIDS FOR CONSTRUCTION ASKED.

The Building Will Contain Sixty Modern Rooms—C. O. Weingand Takes a Ten Year Lease.

Plans for North Platte's new hostelry, the Hotel McCabe, which Dr. N. McCabe will erect on his lots on Dewey street, have been accepted, the specifications will be completed in a week or ten days, and bids for the construction of the building will then be asked. It is hoped to have the new hotel ready for occupancy by the first of February.

The building will be 44x132 feet, three stories, and will contain sixty rooms, in addition to a store room on the south side and the lobby on the north front entrance. The dining room, of sufficient size to accommodate 200, will be in the rear of the lobby. The kitchen, which will be sanitary in every particular, will have tiled floor and walls. Each of the sixty bed chambers will be provided with hot and cold water and closets, and a number of the rooms will have baths attached, the bath rooms in all numbering twenty-six. The lighting fixtures throughout will be of a new design found only in buildings that have been erected during the past year. A passenger elevator will be one of the conveniences, and fire escapes have been provided for at both the front and rear of the building.

C. O. Weingand has leased the hotel for a period of ten years, and in the lease is the proviso that should they be needed at any time, thirty additional rooms will be provided. The furnishings in every department of the new hotel will be thoroughly modern; in fact it is the intention to have the Hotel McCabe classed among the best in the state. Knowing Mr. Weingand as we do, we all feel assured that as lessee of the hotel there will be nothing lacking in the furnishings or in its conduct.

In providing this new hotel for North Platte, Dr. McCabe is to be commended for his progressiveness. We long have needed this addition, and we feel sure that the citizens will give both Dr. McCabe as owner, and Mr. Weingand as lessee all the encouragement possible.

## Two Promising Ball Games

One year ago yesterday the Austrian archduke Francis Ferdinand and his wife were shot and killed in the little Bosnia town of Sarajevo by Garvia Prinzip. It was the act of Prinzip, a poor student, which ultimately resulted in eleven nations going to war. These nations are, on one hand, Great Britain, France, Russia, Serbia, Japan, Belgium, Italy and Montenegro, and, on the other, Germany, Austria and Turkey. The war to date, according to conservative estimates compiled from the best available reports, has caused a loss to the various belligerents of more than six million men, dead, wounded and prisoners, and more than five hundred ships. Of these about 120 were war-vessels.
