3:30 p. m.—Baseball at athletic park, Ogallala vs. North Platte. 6:00 p. m.—Supper. 7:00—Amusements, shows, dances, band concerts, etc.

Entertain for Colonel Cody. Colonel Cody who arrived with the Sells-Floto Show Sunday morning, was the guest of honor at two functions, a dinner party at the home of Mr. and Mrs. C. F. Temple and a smoker at the Elks club in the evening.

At the dinner, which was a most excellent one, covers were laid for twelve, and the guests principally were old-time friends of Colonel Cody. In serving this course dinner Mrs. Temple was assisted by her sisters, Mrs. Dr. Sims and Miss Myrtle Beeler. Following dinner an hour was spent in telling incidents of the early days, and later the party was driven to the former Cody ranch.

At the smoker in the evening a hundred or more Elks assembled to greet their brother Elk, the Colonel, and about two hours were spent in hearing entertaining stories of frontier days told by Colonel Cody, Major Walker and P. H. McEvoy all three of whom were with the Fifth cavalry in the Indian campaigns.

Colonel Cody expressed himself as highly gratified with the hospitality accorded him by his North Platte friends.

Bridge Work to Begin July 15th. W. L. Cary, representing the Omaha Structural Steel Co., spent Saturday in town and in company with the superintendent who will have charge of the construction of the new steel bridge east of town, made an examination of the site. Mr. Cary said the material for the bridge would be shipped in the immediate future and that work could start about July 15th. The superintendent thought that if no unforeseen difficulties arose, the bridge could be completed by November 1st.

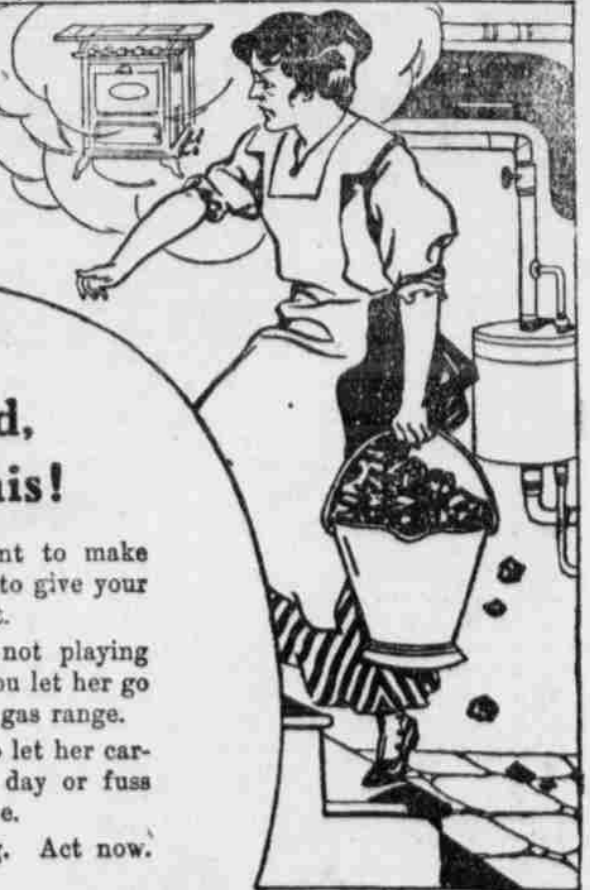
