Alleged Cattle Thieves Bound Over

Will Beatty and Warren Soules, of Brady, were bound over to the district court Saturday morning on the charge of cattle stealing. Bonds were placed at \$500 each, which were furnished. The preliminary hearing was held before Judge French Friday and terminated Saturday morning. The state introduced several witnesses, but the defendants made no defense, asking for a dismissal on the grounds of insufficient evidence. The two calves alleged to have been stolen from Bergman were introduced in evidence, one bearing Soules' brand, the other Beatty's brand. Bergman claims that the calves were taken from his pasture by Beatty or Soules, or by both, and claims that he positively identifies the calves as his. A daughter of the complaining witness, and also other members of the family claim that the animals belong to Bergman.

The case attracted much attention by reason of the prominence of the parties charged with the theft.


