James Danze, who was internally injured Sunday afternoon, when an automobile in which he was riding turned turtle, died at 2:15 yesterday afternoon. Following the accident four physicians united in their efforts to save the life of this popular ball player, but without avail.

James Danze was born in Omaha February 20th, 1891. Before becoming a resident of this city he was in the employ of the McKeen Motor Works for a number of years as steam fitter and also followed the plumbing trade in Omaha.

He came to North Platte two years ago with the Mink ball team which played here during the summer of 1913. On the 20th day of the following September he was married to Miss Elizabeth Haviland of this city, who survives him, and again took up his residence in Omaha. A year ago he returned to accept a position in the Davis garage where he was a trusted and faithful employe. To mourn him are left his wife, a baby daughter, his parents, Mr. and Mrs. Joseph Danze of Omaha four sisters and two brothers, also of Omaha.

The funeral services will be held at half past three this afternoon at the residence of Mr. and Mrs. William Anderson, 603 west Eighth street and the remains taken to Omaha this evening.

Citizens Endorse Park Proposition
At the regular monthly meeting of the Chamber of Commerce Wednesday, about forty being present, the proposition to vote bonds for the purchase of the Dillon tract of land for park purposes was discussed by a number of those present.
