Boosters Take Two From Bridgeport.
The victorious march of the Bridgeport ball team was checked Saturday and Sunday when the North Platte Boosters took both games, the first by a score of five to four and the second by a seven to four score. In Saturday's game the Boosters played errorless ball and secured four runs in the fourth and one in the seventh, and took six hits off Tibbitts. Bridgeport made three runs in the third and one in the ninth, took seven hits off Artley and were credited with five errors.

For Sunday's game a special train was run over the branch, about seventy-five leaving this terminal, but at all stations along the line passengers were picked up, and when Northport was reached there were 250 or 200 on board.

About a thousand people witnessed Sunday's game, and the fans were unusually enthusiastic, the North Platte bunch occupying one section of the grand stand and yelling themselves hoarse. In this game the supposedly matchless Maples occupied the box for Bridgeport, and while he struck out fourteen Boosters, he was in turn touched up for ten hits. The Boosters secured two runs in the fourth, two in the fifth, two in the seventh and one in the ninth. Five errors were marked up against the Boosters, but as a rule they were not costly. Bridgeport secured two runs in the third, one in the eighth and one in the ninth, took six hits off Luby and made three errors. Features of Sunday's game were a one-hand catch by Grimm, two double plays by the Boosters, and the batting of Bright and Getman. In the two games Bright made three three-baggers and three two-baggers.

The North Platte betting contingent returned with six or eight hundred dollars of Bridgeport money.

Owing to an accident to the engine at Lisco, the special did not reach here until 1:30 at night, two hours later than scheduled.

Those who made the trip express themselves as having had a very satisfactory day, though pretty well tired out by the 250 mile trip and the general excitement at the grounds and on the cars.

Bridge Washed Out.

The bridge on the Lincoln highway a short distance below the gate entrance to the Turpie ranch was washed out early Sunday morning by a rush of water that came down the gully from the hills. The bridge was lifted off the mud sills and carried intact a distance of nearly a half mile, lodging in the Turpie meadow. Commissioner Hemminghaus was notified Sunday morning and with County Consul Hoagland took down two wagon loads of lumber and a couple men and built a temporary bridge, which later will be replaced with one of steel. The road from the bridge to the first turn east was badly washed, as was also the road at the old Thoelecke place.

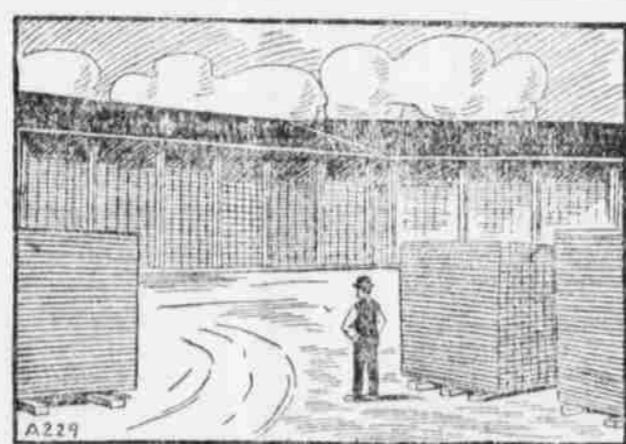
