City School Report

Elsewhere is published the annual financial report of Secretary A. F. Stretz, of the Board of Education, and as our heaviest item of taxation is our schools, it is worth the time of tax-payers to read the report.

During the last year the cost of operating the schools was a little over \$40,000, of which about \$3,800 in round numbers was expended for improvements, repairs and furniture, the running expenses absorbing the balance.

In his statistical report to the county superintendent, Secretary Stretz gives the value of our school property at \$123,300, against which there is a bonded indebtedness of \$73,000. Last year \$2,000 of the bonded debt was paid.

The census shows 1728 children of school age in the district, 868 males and 860 females, and of this number 1043 are subject to the compulsory school law. The total enrollment last year reached 1547, with an average daily attendance of 1198.

Thirty-two female and six male teachers were employed last year.

Taking the cost of operating the schools at \$40,000 and the enrollment at 1547, the cost of educating each pupil per year is \$26.60.

At the bottom of Secretary Stretz's financial report is the statement that during the past five years the high school has earned over 2,500 from country districts which is unpaid. This represents the tuition of country pupils which is charged to the districts from which the pupils come, but owing to the lameness of the law this tuition is in many cases uncollectible or else slow in collecting. That this sum has not been collected is not due to the laxness of the Board of Education. Hereafter pupils from the districts indebted to the local district will not be accepted unless the tuition is paid in advance. This action is certainly well taken.

Compared with the 1914 report the 1915 census shows a gain of seventy-five pupils of school age, and the total enrollment shows an increase of sixty. The expenses of 1914 were \$38,649.

ORDINANCE NUMBER 68.

Being the General Levy of Taxes on the Property of the City of North Platte, Nebraska, for Revenue Purposes during the fiscal year, commencing the Second Monday in August, 1915.

Be it ordained by the Mayor and Council of said City of North Platte, Nebraska:

SECTION I. Taxes are hereby levied on all of the property within the limits of the City of North Platte, Lincoln County, Nebraska, at the rate of Five Mills on the dollar of the assessed valuation thereof, for the purpose of paying interest and principal on the One Hundred Thousand Dollar water bonds heretofore issued by said City.

SECTION II. Taxes are hereby levied on all of the property within the limits of said City at the rate of One and One-half Mills on the dollar of the assessed valuation for the purpose of paying the interest and principal of the Twenty-seven Thousand Dollar sewer bonds heretofore issued by said City.

SECTION III. Taxes are hereby levied on all of the property within the limits of said City at the rate of Three-fourth Mill on the Dollar of the assessed valuation thereof, for the purpose of paying the interest on Twelve Thousand Dollar Bridge bonds heretofore issued by said City.

SECTION IV. Taxes are hereby levied on all of the property within the limits of the said City at the rate of Three-fourth Mill on the Dollar of the assessed valuation thereof, for the purpose of paying the interest on the Sixteen Thousand Dollar Park Bonds heretofore issued by said City.

SECTION V. Taxes are hereby levied on all of the property within the limits of the said City at the rate of One Mill on the Dollar of the assessed valuation thereof, for the purpose of paying the interest on the Sixteen Thousand Dollar Paving Bonds heretofore issued by said City.

SECTION VI. Taxes are hereby levied on all of the property within the limits of the said City at the rate of Four Mills on the dollar of the assessed valuation thereof, for general revenue purposes of said City for the fiscal year beginning the Second Monday in August, 1915.

SECTION VII. Taxes are hereby levied on all of the property within the limits of the said City at the rate of One and one-half Mills on the Dollar of the assessed valuation thereof, for the public Library fund to be expended in the maintenance of the free public library of said City for said fiscal year.

SECTION VIII. Taxes are hereby levied on all of the property within the limits of said City at the rate of One Mill on the Dollar of the assessed valuation to be expended for the maintenance of public parks in said City for said fiscal year.

SECTION IX. Taxes are hereby levied on all of the property within the limits of said City at the rate of Two Mills on the Dollar of the assessed valuation thereof, to be expended in the maintaining, repair and upkeep of the municipal highways for said fiscal year.

SECTION X. Taxes are hereby levied on all the property within the limits of said City at the rate of Three and one-half Mills on the Dollar of the assessed valuation for the pay for the lighting of the streets and alleys of said City for said fiscal year.

SECTION XI. Taxes are hereby levied on all of the property within the limits of said City at the rate of Two and one-half Mills on the Dollar of the assessed valuation thereof, to be expended in the maintenance and flushing of sewers.

SECTION XII. Taxes are hereby levied on all of the property within the limits of said City at the rate of Five Mills on the Dollar of the assessed valuation thereof, for the maintaining of the expense of the fire department and the paying for fire protection for said fiscal year.

SECTION XIII. This ordinance shall take effect and be in force from and after its passage, approval and publication, according to law.

AN ORDINANCE NO. 69.

Being the Annual Appropriation Bill of Expenses of the City of North Platte, Nebraska, for the Fiscal Year beginning the Second Monday in August, 1915.

Be it ordained by the Mayor and Council of the City of North Platte, Nebraska:

SECTION I. There is hereby appropriated the entire proceeds of the occupation taxes collected during the fiscal year beginning the Second Monday in August, 1915, for General Revenue purposes including salaries of said City Officials.

SECTION II. There is hereby appropriated the whole proceeds of the City's levy of Five Mills for Water Bond Interest, to pay interest and principal of the One Hundred Thousand Dollar Water Bonds heretofore issued by said City to be known as the Water Bond Interest Fund of 1915.

SECTION V. There is hereby appropriated the whole proceeds of the City Occupation tax on Fire Insurance Companies for the use of the North Platte Fire Department.

SECTION VI. There is hereby appropriated the whole proceeds of the City's levy of One and one-half Mills to be expended in the maintenance of the Public Library in said City for said Fiscal year, to be known as the Public Library Fund of 1915.

SECTION VII. There is hereby appropriated the whole proceeds of the City's levy of One Mill, to be expended and used for amusements, for laying out, improving and beautifying city parks, and for the payment of salaries and wages of persons employed in the performance of such labor, to be known as the Park Fund of 1915.

SECTION VIII.—There is hereby appropriated the whole of the proceeds of said City's levy of two and one-half mills to pay the expenses of maintenance of the city's sewers, including the expense of flushing the same during said fiscal year, to be known as the sewer maintenance fund of 1915.

SECTION IX.—There is hereby appropriated the proceeds of the income of the Water Department of said City for said fiscal year to be expended in the payment of salaries, expenses and maintenance, renewals and extensions of the said Water Works, for said fiscal year, and to be known as the water fund of 1915.

SECTION X.—There is hereby appropriated the whole proceeds of the city's levy of three-fourths mill for bridge bond interest to pay interest and principal of the twelve thousand dollar bridge bond heretofore issued by the said city, to be known as the bridge bond interest fund of 1915.

SECTION XI.—There is hereby appropriated the whole proceeds of the city's levy of three-fourths mill for Park and Bond Interest to pay interest and principal of the Twelve Thousand Dollar Park Bonds heretofore issued by said City, to be known as the Park Bond Interest Fund of 1915.

SECTION XII.—There is hereby appropriated the whole proceeds of the City's levy of One Mill for Paving Bond Interest to pay interest and principal of the Sixteen Thousand Dollar Paving Bonds heretofore issued by said City, to be known as the Paving Bond Interest Fund of 1915.

SECTION XIII.—There is hereby appropriated all of the City's Two Mill levy to be expended in the maintenance, repair and upkeep of the municipal highways, leading into said City, to be known as the Municipal Highway Fund of 1915.

SECTION XIV.—There is hereby appropriated all of the City's levy of One and one-half Mills for Sewer Bond Interest to pay interest and principal of Twenty-seven Thousand Dollar Sewer Bonds heretofore issued by said City, to be known as Sewer Bond Interest Fund of 1915.

SECTION XV.—There is hereby appropriated out of the City's levy of Four Mills for General Fund, the sum of \$1,500.00 for bridges, culverts, streets, grades, drains, sidewalks, and crossings.

SECTION XVI.—There is hereby appropriated all of the rest and residue of the money derived from the said Four Mill General Fund levy, together with the moneys derived from the occupation tax paid during the said fiscal year, and money derived from the police court, fines and costs, and interest on the City Deposit, to be used for lawful expenses, to pay the salary of city officials, election, publishing fees, stationery, accidents, casualties, judgments, special engineering, and all of the items herein appropriated under Sections 15 and 16, shall be known as the General Fund of 1915.

SECTION XVII.—This ordinance shall take effect and be in force from and after its passage, approval and publication, according to law.
