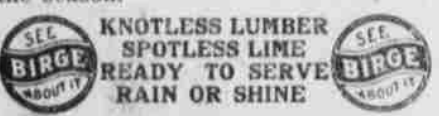
Mrs. Pat McGraw and daughter Euehah, who spent the summer on their ranch west of town, have returned to the city to spend the remainder of the season.
