Migratory Bird Law to be Enforced.

The U. S. Dept. of Agriculture has issued a public circular letter relative to the migratory bird law, a copy of which has been handed The Tribune by John C. Den. This circular in part says: With the approach of the open season for shooting wild fowl, the United States Dept. of Agriculture is warning sportsmen that the Federal regulations as amended October 1, 1914, will be strictly enforced. Some misunderstanding has arisen from the fact that the various state laws do not always conform to the federal regulations. This is regarded as unfortunate but in such cases the department must insist upon the observance of the federal regulations.
