Arrested on a Serious Charge
Charles James and sons Guy and Luther, all three living north of Sutherland, were arraigned in the county court Wednesday on the charge of rape, and pleaded not guilty. The complaining witness is Maude Jones, fourteen years of age, grand daughter of Chas. James, who lived with the James family at the time the deed was committed.

The charge is brought at the instance of the governor and the attorney general of the state. Some time ago the young girl went to Kansas City and while there gave birth to a child. The instance came to the notice of the police authorities, and in the juvenile court of Kansas City she told her story, implicating the two Jameses and Luther. The judge of the juvenile court communicated with Governor Morehead, with the result that the matter was placed in the hands of the attorney-general who instructed County Attorney Gibbs to file a complaint against the three men.

The girl's affidavit was signed by her July 8. She says she is fifteen years of age and had lived at the home of her grandfather near Sutherland for a period of two years and a half prior to July 1 of this year, that one year ago her grandfather began criminal relations and that such relations were sustained since that time by her two uncles. She says she was sent to her aunt, Ann Gladys, 1709 West Prospect street, Kansas City by her grandfather because she was about to become a mother. From the home of her aunt she was taken to a detention home at Kansas City.

Conductor Dave Young was internally injured here Tuesday evening and is now under the care of physicians in an Omaha hospital. He was riding in the caboose of a west bound freight which was about to strike a string of cars in the west yards. The engineer applied the emergency brakes and the force of the sudden stop threw Mr. Young across the desk, which struck him in the abdomen and rendered him unconscious for several hours.

August Weather.
The weather last month was almost a record breaker in two particulars; first in low temperature and second in the amount of precipitation. The mean temperature last month was 68 degrees, and with the exception of August, 1888, it was the coolest August in forty-three years. The average for the 41 years is 72.3.

The precipitation last month was 4.23 inches, while the normal for the month is but 2.46 inches. With the exception of August, 1904, and August, 1892, the rainfall was greater than in any August since 1875. On the morning of August 30th there was a trace of frost.


