**The Local Wheat Market.**  
Complaint having been made that there is no market for grain in North Platte, a committee appointed by the Chamber of Commerce investigated the matter and found that the Coates Lumber & Coal Co., which has leased the Iddings' elevator, is buying all the marketable wheat that is being offered.

Farmers are aware of the fact that for two weeks past much of the wheat that has been marketed has been so damp as to heat in the elevator bin or in the car, and that this is true, is shown by the Omaha quotations, which vary thirty cents, and this variance is largely due to the fact that much of the wheat received had heated in transit.

This damp wheat is found in Lincoln county as well as elsewhere, and while the Coates Co. has bought all wheat offered, it has had to protect itself against that which was damp and subject to heating, and in doing this has paid for it a less price than would have been paid had it been perfectly dry and hard.

It will undoubtedly be to the best interests of the farmers not to thresh, or at least not attempt to market, their wheat until it dries out, for in no market will they receive the price for spongy wheat that they will receive if it is perfectly dry.

The committee assures the farmers of the section tributary to North Platte that they have a market in North Platte for their wheat, and that the highest market price will be paid, based on quality. If the farmer is not offered the price he thinks his wheat should command, the local elevator will handle it through the elevator and ship it for the grower—if in carload lots—at a charge of two cents a bushel. This, the committee believes, is a very fair proposition.

**Fashion Note**  
North Platte ladies will learn with interest that if they are to be well dressed this fall and winter ankle watches must be worn. The skirts will be voluminous and short, very short, reaching only a few inches below the knees. In order that the watch may be consulted while walking without too much peril to the wearer—and perhaps lessen the shock to the passerby, the skirts will be divided, some what like the directoire; the slit about three inches wide and starts at the hip.
