Beard Asks for New Building.

By a unanimous vote the Board of Education at a special meeting held last evening decided to submit a proposition to vote sixty thousand dollars for a Junior high school building. This election will be held on December 7th.

While definite plans of the building have not been prepared, the general plan is to erect a building on the north line of the present high school grounds that will be 65x190 feet three stories high. The basement, the floor of which will be practically level with the ground, will contain rooms for manual training, domestic science and include six shower baths for those who engage in athletic or gymnasium work. On the first floor there will be twelve school rooms, and on the second or top floor there will be four school rooms and an auditorium 65x88 feet, with balcony, the whole to have a seating capacity of about 1,000. This auditorium will also be used as a gymnasium.

The rooms will be used to accommodate the pupils of the seventh and eighth grades in the ward schools thus relieving the congested conditions there that now exists, and to relieve the crowded condition of the present high school building the ninth grade will be transferred to the new building.

While the proposed new building may be somewhat larger than at present needed, the board believes that the mistakes of the past should not be repeated, namely, that each school building erected has been too small—they were erected for present needs and not for the future.

Had we erected a \$60,000 high school building instead of one costing \$39,000, and erected ward buildings costing \$40,000 each instead of \$20,000 each, we would have shown better judgment than we then exercised. However, to remedy our past lack of judgment the proposed building must be erected. We are face to face with a necessity—a problem of greater school accommodations, and we must solve the problem like men without unnecessary delay.

The following is a list of automobiles that are not equipped with tail lamps: Nos. 19933, 9865, 34083, 6709, 19336, 36258, 45451, 67847, 7493, 3945.
