NORTH PLATTE WINS FROM GOTHENBURG 26 TO 7.

In a clean, hard fought foot ball game so far as the players were concerned, North Platte won Friday afternoon from Gothenburg through their superiority in the open game. The locals received the kick off and carried the ball to Gothenburg's goal line, Baker going over but fumbled behind the line. The ball was put in play on the twenty yard line and Gothenburg punted to Cool. The locals again advanced the ball to the twenty-five yard line from which point Thompson scored on a forward pass from Jones. Neither side scored in the second quarter, and the half ended 6 to 0 in favor of North Platte. In the third quarter Gothenburg scored and kicked goal after a series of penalties had placed the ball near North Platte's goal. At the beginning of the fourth quarter with the score seven to six in favor of Gothenburg, the locals held on their ten yard line and receiving the ball opened up and scored in five plays, four of which were passes. Cool running fifteen yards for the touch down after receiving a thirty-five yard pass from Thompson. Twice more in the next seven minutes, North Platte crossed the goal line using the same tactics, Jones making both scores. Gothenburg claims the best team they have ever had. For North Platte the entire team played good ball, but Baker, Bogue and Cool showed, if possible, better than the others. North Platte tried ten forward passes in the last quarter, nine of which were successful. Thompson, Bogue and Cool being the principal passers and Cool, Jones, Baker and Kelly doing most of the receiving. The passing of Thompson classes him with the best.
