How Shall it be Done?

Washington, D. C., Nov. 1.—"In one year the American people must decide how they shall meet a national crisis."

"How shall it be done? That is the question voters must answer one year later. It is a grave responsibility."

"Remember that the balance of trade against us during the four months preceding the war, at a time when democratic policies and laws were in effect, was \$248,000,000."

"In two years the democratic administration has produced such business conditions, that but for the purely accidental stimulus of a foreign war, we would be in the throes of a panic."

"Past history has proven the only way the democratic party, when in power, has been able to meet the extravagant appropriations made by them for the ordinary running expenses of the government, was by the sale of bonds."

"In two years the democratic administration has passed scores of worthless laws. The insertion of meaningless phrases in the statutes, the constant violation of the simplest legislative rules, have brought about more costly and needless federal litigation than we have ever known before."

"In two years the democratic administration has created an enormous deficit in our treasury, and has not advanced a single plan for meeting it. The proposed re-enactment of the sugar duty and the 'war tax' law only retains present revenues. Bond issues are nothing but loans that must be paid for in the future."

"The democratic party has no credit, nor a plan to propose, that will meet the financial crisis inevitably imposed by the national defense program."

"A return of the republican party to power seems to me not only a national necessity but a foregone conclusion."

Mrs. J. B. Hemphill Passes Away

The remains of the late Mrs. J. B. Hemphill, who died in Omaha yesterday morning, were brought here this morning for burial.

Mrs. Hemphill had been ill for several months with hardening of the arteries, and two months ago entered one of the local hospitals for treatment, where she remained four weeks. It was then deemed advisable that she be removed to Omaha.

The change was made and she had since been a patient in the Swedish Mission hospital, where she received the best of medical attention and careful nursing. Her condition became critical last week and relatives were summoned. When the end came her husband and one son of this city and a sister and brother of Lincoln were with her.
