### MRS. MARY NEARY PASSES AWAY SUNDAY MORNING.

Mrs. Mary J. Neary, one of North Platte's most highly respected ladies passed away at one o'clock Sunday morning at the home of her step-daughter, Mrs. M. V. Mitchell, with whom she had resided for a number of years.

Death was due to a complication of diseases and although in poor health for several years, she did not give up but went cheerfully about her daily work. The change came about one month ago and for three weeks she had been in a serious condition. An improvement was noticed the latter part of last week and hopes of her recovery were given until Saturday afternoon when all efforts to stay the course of the disease were of no avail and she realizing that the end was near called her relatives to her bedside and bade them farewell, giving them her blessing and expressing her gratitude for their ministrations.

During her illness she maintained the same amiable manner and patience that characterized her whole life.

Mary Jane Delmore was born in New York City December 25, 1847. Later she moved to Leavenworth, Kan., where at the age of fifteen she was married on February 15, 1862, to Joseph Mackle. To this union were born three children who died in infancy. She came to this city in 1873 and in September, 1882, she suffered the loss of her husband. For six years after his death she conducted a millinery store and on March 7, 1886, she was married to John Neary who died August 22, 1906.

Mrs. Neary was a well read woman and talented in many ways. Her childhood was spent in a convent in Kansas and after her first marriage she traveled extensively. She was one of the most charitable women of this city, a devoted Catholic and of a very affectionate nature. She was a member of the W. R. C. and L. O. T. M.

To mourn her are left two step-daughters, Mrs. M. V. Mitchell and Mrs. H. D. Kenworthy and a sister-in-law Mrs. Sarah Bangs, all of this city.

The funeral services were held at St. Patrick's church at 10 o'clock this morning and attended by the many friends of the deceased who testified by their presence and beautiful floral offerings the high esteem in which she was held. Rev. McDaid read the requiem mass. Miss Sadie Trovillo sang "Some Sweet Day", Charles Pass sang "Calvary" and "Nearer My God to Thee" was sung by the choir.

Interment was made in the North Platte cemetery. The pall bearers were: T. C. Patterson, John Bratt, Wm. Maloney, J. E. Evans, John Boyer and Mr. O'Neil.

#### Uniform Land Assessments

Lincoln Journal: Secretary Bernecker of the state board of equalizations and assessment has returned to Lincoln after holding meetings which were attended by all but ten of the county assessors in the state. As a result of these meetings he believes that the real estate assessment next year will be the best in the history of Nebraska. Mr. Bernecker held meetings at Norfolk, Fremont, Lincoln, Alliance, Grand Island, North Platte, Hastings and McCook.

Secretary Bernecker instructed the county assessors to be certain to secure the sales value of all farm lands changing hands between January 13, next, and the time for beginning the assessment. A report of these sales is to be sent to Mr. Bernecker and one kept by the assessor. One of the secretary's chief aims is to have real estate assessments uniform. To this end the assessors on county lines are to confer with those in the adjoining counties and valuations are to be worked from the lines to the interior.

Every county assessor has been instructed to personally supervise the real estate assessment of his county especially as to farm lands. He must visit every precinct or township and familiarize himself with values in every part of the county, if the instructions of the secretary of the state board are followed.

The county commissioners spent last week appraising forty sections of school land in various parts of the county and find that owing to the number of improvements made in the past year that the assessments on many of them will be increased two hundred per cent. They expect to spend the next two weeks in this work and the assessments will take effect in the 1916 taxes.

#### Notice to Water Consumers.

Owners and agents for houses should see that meter boxes are cleaned out and meters repacked for the winter. Drive four stakes into the ground in bottom of meter box, leaving top an inch or two higher than the top of the meter. Construct a cover just large enough to fit inside the tile, preferably in two pieces and place this on top of stakes, then fill in the top of tile with dry leaves in sacks, or something similar and put on the iron cover. The inside cover just above the meter can be constructed of Beaver Board, or by cutting out a circular piece of rubberoid roofing and tacking same on two lath crossed so as to support it.

I wish to again warn owners against packing meters with manure or wet leaves, as these decay and the ammonia and acids generated attack the registers of the meters, thus ruining them. Several owners have been compelled to purchase new registers due to this cause.

Agents and owners having vacant houses should notify the Water Commissioner and have water shut off at curb so that in case of freezes inside of house or bursted pipes the houses will not be flooded and large water bills run up. Where there are range boilers and toilets in houses these should be drained and water dipped out so that in case of freezing weather no damage may result.

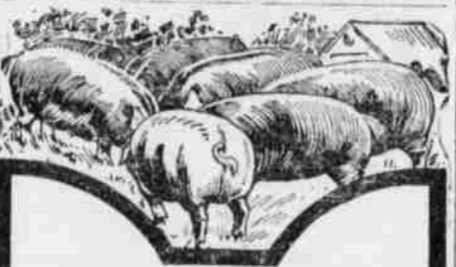
