THE BEATTY AND SOULES CASE NOW ON TRIAL

The case of the State of Nebraska against Will Beatty and Warren Soules on the charge of cattle stealing is now in progress in the district court. The selection of a jury began Wednesday morning, and after the twelve jurors who were free from a case had been passed or rejected, nearly one hundred talsmen were summoned, and yet twelve men satisfactory to the prosecution or the defense had not been secured. The jury in the Giles-Horner case, which came in Wednesday evening after being out nearly twenty-four hours, were then examined and from these a number sufficient to fill the chairs was obtained. The opening statements by the prosecution and defense were made prior to the noon adjournment, and the taking of testimony begun in the afternoon.

The prosecution is being conducted by County Attorney Gibbs and W. V. Hoagland and Wilcox & Halligan, Beeler & Crosby and Robert Beatty are attorneys for the defense.
