JURY FIND BEATTY AND SOULES GUILTY

The case of the State against Will Beatty and Warren Soules, charged with cattle steal, was given to the jury at four o'clock yesterday afternoon and at eleven o'clock last night a verdict of guilty was returned.

The trial of this case created unusual interest, partly because of the prominence of the family of one of the defendants, and again by reason of factional feeling that exists in Brady and surrounding section. Nearly two days was spent in securing a jury, nearly a hundred talesmen being examined. The prosecution of the case began Thursday afternoon, the state introducing about twenty witnesses and the defense fifteen. The evidence was largely circumstantial and very contradictory. The main contention was whether two head of cattle in the possession of Beatty and Soules were the property of Bergman. The identity of these cattle, however, seems to have been proven to the satisfaction of the jury.

Though Judge Hobart was on the bench during the trial of the case, by consent of the prosecution, he was given the privilege of returning home last night and the verdict was made returnable to Judge Grimes, who will impose the sentence. The penalty is from one to ten years in the penitentiary.

District Court Notes

Following the retiring of the jury in Beatty and Soules case a jury was empaneled, and this morning the case of the State against U. G. Smith was called. This is a case where the defendant is charged with setting fire to and burning a house in the Fourth ward belonging to Roy Bunnell, Deputy State Fire Commissioner. Requisite has been in town for a couple of days assisting County Attorney Gibbs in gathering evidence in the case.

Judge Hobart, who has been on the bench since court opened a week ago yesterday, left for his home in Scotts Bluff last night. Judge Grimes will take the bench today and it is probable that tomorrow evening he will announce that court will stand adjourned until December 6th.

Lincoln County Oats Crop.

The report of the state board of agriculture gives the oats crop of Lincoln county for 1915 at 671,520 bushels. The average yield per acre was forty bushels and the number of acres in oats 16,780. The yield in the state averaged thirty-four bushels per acre, therefore the yield in Lincoln county was six bushels per acre above the average.
