RESOLUTION OF THE Council of the City of North Platte, Nebraska, created by Ordinance No. 1

WHEREAS, the City of North Platte, Nebraska, did at a special election held on September 14th, 1915, vote to authorize the issue of bonds in the sum of \$1,000 for the purpose of paving street intersections and spaces opposite alleys within said city and which said bond issue is now available for such purpose.

THEREFORE, BE IT RESOLVED, by the Mayor and Council of the City of North Platte, Nebraska, that Ordinance No. 1 of the City of North Platte be and the same is hereby created to be composed of the following streets and portions of streets therein and contained within the limits and boundaries herein set forth and defined, to-wit:

That portion of Dewey Street lying between the south side of Ninth Street and the north side of Third Street; all that portion of Dewey Street lying between the north side of Front Street and the north side of Third Street; all that portion of Pine Street lying between the north side of Front Street and the south side of Sixth Street; all that portion of Front Street lying between the east line of Vine Street and the west line of Chestnut Street; all that portion of Sixth Street lying between the east line of Vine Street and the east side of Pine Street; all that portion of Fifth Street lying between the east line of Vine Street and the west line of Pine Street; all that portion of Fourth Street lying between the west line of Locust Street and the west line of Pine Street

and that portion of Pine Street lying between the north side of Front Street and the south side of Sixth Street; all that portion of Front Street lying between the east line of Vine Street and the west line of Chestnut Street; all that portion of Sixth Street lying between the east line of Vine Street and the east side of Pine Street; all that portion of Fifth Street lying between the east line of Vine Street and the west line of Pine Street
