Pitcher Sheffield, of Ogalalla, spent the week end here with local friends and left Saturday evening.

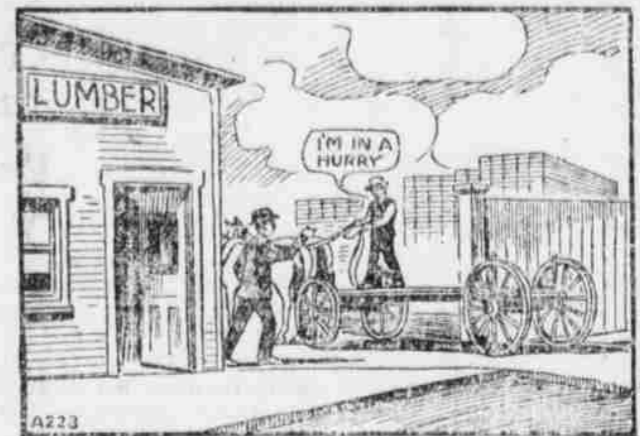

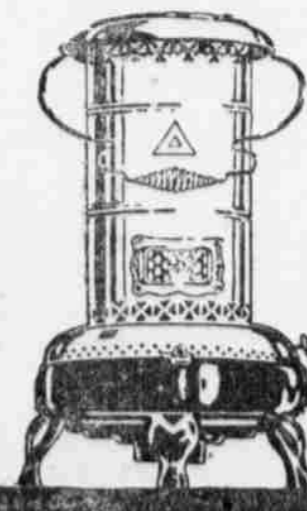
