The Psychology of Practice.

The question of short versus long periods of practice in training the human muscles for any particular kind of work is obviously one having farreaching application. Some interesting experiments on this subject have been carried out by Dr. K. S. Lashley of Johns Hopkins university. Acquisition from her homestead at Melrose last of skill in archery was selected as the subject of observation. Twenty untrained persons were divided into three groups. One group shot five arrows with the English longbow per day; another twenty shots per day and the third forty shots. The result showed conclusively that the group shooting only five times a day improved in ac curacy with less expenditure of time in practice than was required by either of the other groups for the same amount of improvement. A report of the experiments says: "The relatively greater efficiency of short periods of practice continuing for many days is in accordance with the results of the
