GOSSIP ABOUT MEDICINE BOW SHORT LINE

A dispatch from Torrington, Wyo., dated December 6th, says:

"It has been reported that the Union Pacific railroad is about to begin work on the long contemplated cut-off road between North Platte, Neb., and Medicine Bow, Wyo. The survey for this road passes through the famous Goshen Hole at a point about ten miles south of Torrington. It has been reported that this road has contracted for winter quarters for the construction gang at Fort Laramie, but this inference must have been taken from the presence of the government camp that is located near Fort Laramie station.

The proposed line has been built up the south side of the river as far west as the town of Haik, where the large beet fields afford freight to be hauled to the sugar factory.

It is only a matter of judgment, up to the officials of the road, whether they should build the road before the south side ditch is constructed, and by so doing get the hauling for the construction of the ditch, or to wait until the ditch is built and profit from the hauling furnished from agriculture that is sure to follow.

There will be 120,000 acres of land watered by the new ditch, and all of this will be settled and farmed. The immigrant business will be no small item of freight, then the regular business from the agricultural fields and from the mines to the west of us, will be a source of lucrative business in the years to come."

Regulations of the Board of Health, Adopted Dec. 6th, 1915.

I. Where the disease of small pox shall be determined to exist in any dwelling house, apartment or establishment within the City of North Platte or within one mile of the limits thereof, such house, apartment or establishment shall be forthwith quarantined and shall be under the immediate and sole jurisdiction of the Board of Health and any and all members of said household or establishment who have had opportunity to be exposed to said disease shall be confined and held in quarantine therein until such time as the Physician of the City shall believe all danger of contracting said disease shall have passed. Provided the head of the family may be released after having been disinfecting by or under the direction of said City Physician and provided such head of the family shall provide himself with quarters and accommodations separate and apart from his establishment under quarantine.

II. Any person quarantined by the Board of Health who shall leave such quarantined establishment or violate any directions or instructions of the Health Officers shall be prosecuted under the ordinances of the City and be subject to the penalty imposed to-wit: A fine not to exceed \$100.

III. Any person not under quarantine, or any head of family or other person who shall have been released, who shall enter or frequent any establishment under quarantine or per-

mit himself to be exposed to such disease, shall be placed under quarantine together with such other persons as such party may have exposed to such disease in the judgment of the City Physician, and shall in addition be subject to the penalty imposed by law.

Attention is called to the fact that all cases of small pox or cases of symptoms should be immediately reported. BOARD OF HEALTH OF THE CITY OF NORTH PLATTE.
