Dr. Mitchell will join them next week.

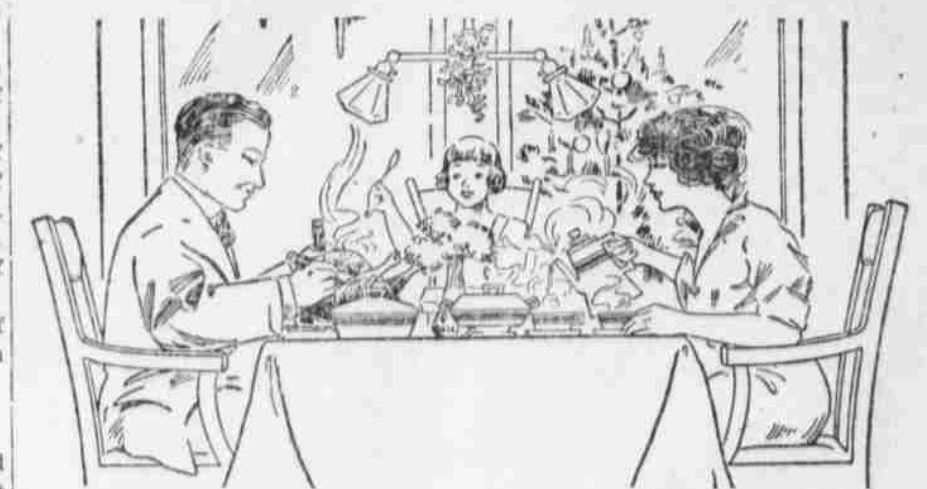
Dr. and Mrs. Fred Wurtele will leave the latter part of the week for Wyoming, where they will spend Christmas with relatives.
