Final Proof on Homesteads.

During 1915 final proof was made on 196 homesteads at the local U. S. land office, as compared with 325 in 1914, and 815 in 1913. This decrease year by year shows how nearly all the public domain in western Nebraska has passed to the assessment rolls and taxed for local and state government. It is also evidence that in a few years the land offices in the west part of the state will have fulfilled their mission and be discontinued.

Of the 196 proofs made last year, thirty-nine were on land located in Lincoln county.
