Same Man on Both Tickets

The progressive party will hold its national convention June 7 in Chicago, concurrently with the national convention of the republican party in the hope that both may agree on the same candidate for president. This action was decided upon Tuesday by the national committee of the progressive party. Forty-seven of the forty-eight states were represented at the meeting. Before adjourning the committee adopted a declaration of principles in which the administration of President Wilson was criticised for its alleged failure to deal adequately with national honor and industrial welfare and the progressive party went on record as favoring a complete preparedness, consisting of military armament as well as a mobilization of all the country's resources with a view of the unification of American citizenship.

REDFIELD WARNS U. S. OF TRADE SLUMP AFTER WAR

Washington.—Secretary Redfield, in a memorandum on business conditions transmitted to President Wilson, pictures the country as in the most prosperous state in its history. The warning is added, though, that war's inflation of commerce will last only until war's end, and that business foresight alone will prepare the United States for peace.

The slump that will follow the war abroad, the secretary's summary declares, must find Americans ready to take their share of the world's trade unhampered by provincial nations. False values created by unusual conditions, he fears, may lull the United States into a fancied commercial security. "It is not to be expected," the secretary says, "that our business movement will continue in its present form. No one dreams that we can now, or in the future, maintain an export movement of more than \$5,000,000,000 actual value, or that we may scarcely expect an apparent net balance in our favor on merchandise transactions of \$2,000,000,000 in any one year."

A petition was circulated here the latter part of last week for Judge Grimes of the district court, in order that his name be placed on the primary ballot at the spring election. Something less than fifty signatures are required on the petition in this county. Judge Grimes is so well known and popular over this district that it is safe to predict his election and possibly that he will have no opposition at either primary or general election.—Chappell Register.

Colonel Cody left for the Pine Ridge agency to engage Indians for the Wild West Show.

Pastor Clifton was conducting a revival at the Methodist church and sending red hot shells into the camp of the sinners. Many were being converted.

C. F. Iddings, one of the presidential electors for Nebraska, had gone to Lincoln to cast his vote for Harrison and Morton.

A. P. Strelitz was elected president of the state board of pharmacy at the annual meeting held at Lincoln.

Colonel Cody presented the Buffalo Bill Hook and Ladder Company with one hundred dollars in gold. E. B. Warner was captain of the company and Arthur McNamara secretary.

Supt. Potter, of the Union Pacific, proposed consolidating the shops at Sidney and North Platte and moving them to Ogalala. North Platte was "all torn up" over the proposition.

The North Platte Land and Irrigation Co., of which Isaac Dillon was president, T. J. Foley secretary and J. H. McConnell treasurer, was offering 6,000 acres of irrigated land for sale.

A charity entertainment under the direction of P. H. Sullivan was to be staged the following week. At that time Mr. Sullivan was quite a theatrical promoter.

buys Nearly 70,000 Bushels of Wheat.

Manager Coates of the Coates Lumber and Coal Co., informs The Tribune that so far he has purchased between 65,000 and 70,000 bushels of 1915 wheat from farmers in the country tributary to North Platte. The average price paid has been eighty-five cents per bushel, this average being low because in the beginning of the marketing season considerable of the wheat was wet and spongy and was hardly fit to market and brought a low price. This week the price for good No. 3 wheat has been around ninety-eight cents.

Mr. Coates says that only about half of the wheat grown in the section tributary to North Platte has so far been marketed.
