Excess of Precipitation.

The year 1915 closed with a precipitation of thirty-two and seven-tenths inches or nearly fourteen inches in excess of the normal, which is 18.86 inches. These figures are obtained from the local weather bureau and therefore correct. As a result of this excess precipitation, the crop raised in the county was the heaviest ever grown, but unfortunately the quality was not in keeping with the yield, and this applies particularly to corn. With the unusual rain came cool weather; in fact corn made mighty slow growth prior to August 1st, and as a result there was much soft corn. Had the season been warm instead of cool, the corn crop of Lincoln county would have been worth a half million dollars more.

Charley Robinson Breaks Arm.

Chas. A. Robinson, living north of the river suffered a broken arm yesterday forenoon. He was engaged in filling the Krug vault with ice and was riding the cakes up the chute. The cakes buckled and he was precipitated to the ground, a distance of eight feet, and in falling the arm doubled under him causing the fracture.
