WILL FABLINGER BECOMES VIOLENTLY INSANE

Will Fablinger was brought in from Garfield precinct yesterday by Sheriff Salisbury in a violently insane condition. He was placed in a cell room at the county jail and will have a hearing before the board of insanity today.

Fablinger became mentally deranged while serving as a juror in the district court week before last. He is a young man, married last June, and under normal conditions is a very quiet, unassuming individual. He was devotedly religious and it is thought that the evidence in the James and Fear cases, on both of which he sat as a juror, shocked his religious sensitiveness and deranged his mind. The cases involved the honor of women, and the testimony was consequently at times such as to shock a man of modest and retiring disposition. At least this is the supposed cause of Fablinger's insanity, for prior to coming to North Platte to attend court he gave no evidence of mental derangement.

The case is one that saddens all the acquaintances of the afflicted man.

North Platte Boys as Authors

The work of destroying the book is done at the library so that there may be no question as to its destruction.

HORSE THEIF NOW LANGUISHES IN JAIL

A fellow named Townsend was arrested at Gandy yesterday on the charge of stealing a horse from Harry P. Stevens living south of Maxwell, and last night was brought in by Deputy Sheriff Wilson and lodged in jail.

Townsend had been working for several months for Mr. Stevens and apparently coveted a very fine horse belonging to the latter. As time passed this desire to possess the animal increased, and finally he concluded to assume the role of a horse thief. He made his get away with the animal Saturday night. The disappearance of the man and horse was discovered early the next morning and Sheriff Salisbury notified. The latter immediately got busy with the telephone lines, with the result that thirty hours after Townsend left the Stevens ranch he was in custody of the Logan county sheriff. The horse was recovered, left at Gandy and will be taken home by the owner.

The case against Townsend is so clear that he will undoubtedly plead guilty, in which case he will appear before Judge Grimes within a week and be sentenced. Thus will the population at the penitentiary credited to Lincoln county be increased.

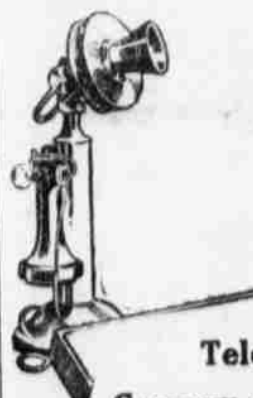
