The Cost of Automobiles,

To the Editor:- I notice by a Lincoln paper that Lincoln county has 43 automobiles. Have you stopped to consider the expenses of maintain ment? If money is not plentiful in

Here are some figures: If these cars cost an average of \$700 each the total is, \$520-100; if the life of a car is on these cars is \$104,925. On the supposition that each car averages 3,000 miles during the year, the total mile age is 2,222,900, and if they average fifteen miles on a gallon of gas the consumption at a cost of fourteen cents a gallon (last year's average price) or a total of \$20,804; if a car runs 400 miles on a gallon of lubricating oil 5,572 galous of that oil was consumed at a cost of \$2,786. Counting tire cost at one cent a mile which is low, the total is \$22,290; the yearly license on the cars is \$2,200, then in addition each car will average a repair bill or other garage charge of \$10 or 37,430, the taxes amount to not less than \$5,000, the insurance \$7,500, and the interest on the original investment of \$520,000 is \$30.000 per year. Add all these figures together and you have a total of \$200,000 expenses SAM FLOCK. for a year.


