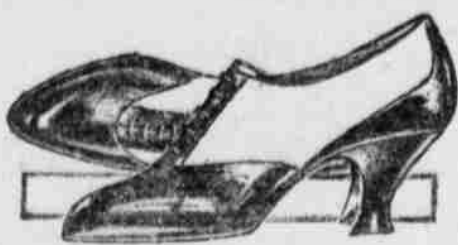

The number of people attending the Yeoman Drill Team Masquerade Tuesday evening at the Lloyd opera house was the largest that patronized any previous event in that hall. At eight o'clock the seating capacity of the gallery and floor was taxed and many of the three hundred and fifty-two spectators were obliged to stand until the hour of unmasking when the greater number of them joined in the dancing which continued until one a. m. One hundred and twenty-five were counted among the maskers and the costumes were as varied as they were unique. At ten o'clock a grand march led by A. W. Shilling and Mrs. W. J. Tiley was held which gave the seven judges an opportunity of inspecting each costume and awarding prizes. For the best group of five a ten dollar prize was won by Mesdames A. W. Shilling, L. L. Berthe, Jack Sinclair, A. W. Brown and Miss Mildred Fitzpatrick who represented "Folly" and were attired in neat suits of black and white with rosette and bell trimmings. W. J. Tiley created much amusement and was awarded first gentleman's prize for his take off of "Gloomy Gus." Mrs. W. J. Landgraf as a "Salvation Army Lass" was given first ladies' prize and Charles Thornburg as a fat, clumsy Dutchman won the prize for the most comic character. Each of the above received two dollars in cash. The judges were Messrs. Joseph Schatz, Arthur Rush, Frank Distel, Cy Askwig, Ralph Ford, Will Waltemath and P. R. Halligan. For this occasion the hall was decorated in red, cupids, large hearts and battle-axes tinted with gilt, designed and arranged by Mr. and Mrs. L. L. Berthe, and created a pretty effect. ### NEWS NOTES FROM

#### THE CITY SCHOOLS

At the last meeting of the board of education Miss Beryl Hahn was added to the list of music teachers approved by the board for giving private lessons to high school pupils for credit. Miss Hahn is well known by the music people of the city and was well recommended both by her instructors in the University School of Music and by former patrons and pupils in this city. The complete list of approved music teachers is as follows: Professor Garlicks, Mrs. Cramer, Miss O'Hare, Miss Ottenstein, Mr. Stamp, Miss Frater, Miss McKay and Miss Hahn.

A photograph of the foot ball team of 1915 has been sent to the publishers of Spaulding's Foot Ball Guide, at their request for insertion in the 1916 edition of that standard work. The high school boys have been unsuccessful so far in getting a place to play basket ball this winter and it looks as though they will have to wait until the new gymnasium is completed before they can have a basket ball team.

A class of thirty Juniors and Seniors have taken up the study of Economics under the instruction of Prin. M. M. Redenbaugh. This is a valuable study for young people when a full class can be secured. It is planned to give Economics and Zoology during alternate years, if there is a demand for either.

Many people of this city do not know that the boundaries of the school district and those of the city do not coincide. The North Platte school district extends about four miles west of the city and the little school house, known as the Baker School, located three miles west and north of here is in this school district and under the supervision of the local board of education. Supt. Tout made a trip to this school this week and found everything going along nicely. Miss Catherine Johnson is the teacher and she has 27 pupils. The attendance is good for February and the interest and spirit of the pupils was commended.

In September, 914, Houston, Texas, opened up two elegantly appointed Junior high schools. The buildings had been erected for the future but the second year they had 1000 students enrolled, or 400 more than the buildings were designed to accommodate. This indicates the popularity of the Junior high school idea. North Platte will open up her first Junior high school next fall.

M. Elias, janitor of the Jefferson building had quite a fall last week and is suffering from a bruised shoulder but with the help of the boys of that building he has been able to attend to his duties.

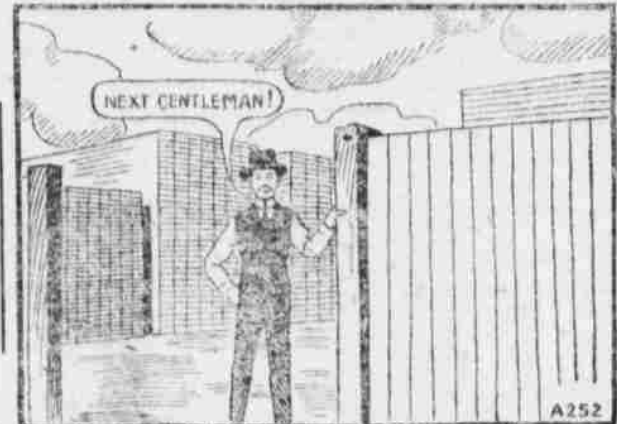
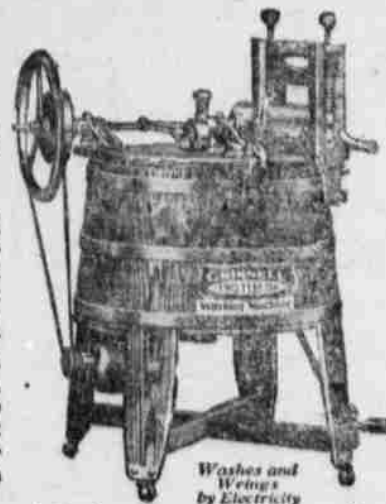
