A chart hanging in the office of the ways and means committee at Washington shows the following facts collected by Congressman Kitchin: At the expiration of the five-year period more than any nation in the world in times of peace ever expended on its army and navy; more than England, with her navalism more than Russia or Germany with their huge militarism. At the beginning of the European war Germany was expending for past wars (on its army and navy) 55 per cent of the total amount of revenues collected. Japan '45 per cent; Great Britian 37 per cent, the United States over 60 per cent. With the program enacted into law the United States will be expending over 70 per cent of its total revenues-that is out of the \$100 collected from the people over \$70 will go into militarism and navalism, including \$22 for pensions leaving \$30 for all functions of our government and for all other
