#### A Tribute to Keith Neville. John J. Halligan pays the follow-

#### Much Soggy Corn on Market.

Eastern grain markets, including Omaha, state that corn is almost a drug on the market, being quoted as w as twenty-two cents a bushel and little bought up at that price. The corn referred to is the grain which faited to mature last fall and is not of the best of quality. The return of warm weather has brought about some unexpected conditions with respect to the corn market. It has developed the fact that there is a lot of corn in the state that it is so soft and completely soaked with water that it has almost no market value. While the weather was cold, very little of the corn appeared to be soft, but with the raising of the temperature and continuation of warm weather, the corn that during the month of January seemed of the very best is now thawed and found to be soggy. Some grain men state that a portion of it is likely to rot before it can be dried out. The bulk of the corn in Kearney and Buffalo county is good, but there is more soft corn than was bargained for, acording to reports received. - Kearney Hub
