#### Burr Returns to Nebraska.

Word has just been received confirming the report that W. W. Burr of the United States Department of Agriculture has accepted a position in the university of Nebraska as head of the soils and crop department in the College of Agriculture and Experiment Station. This change combines all the instructional and investigational work relating to soils and to crops under one department with Mr. Burr in charge. For seven years Mr. Burr was connected with the soil and crop work at the North Platte substation, leaving here to follow the same line of work in the United States department of agriculture. During the three years that he has been with the department he with John Cole has had charge of work at 22 federal and state experiment stations located in Montana, North Dakota, South Dakota, Wyoming, Nebraska, Colorado, Kansas, Oklahoma, New Mexico and Texas. It is very gratifying to know that the university of Nebraska has again obtained Mr. Burr's services as the head of one of the most important departments in the university.

#### Wilson Files for Commissioner.

James C. Wilson, who lives in this city but owns a thousand or more acres of irrigated farm land in Hinman precinct, filed Wednesday as a democratic candidate for county commissioner from the first or North Platte district. Mr. Wilson is recognized as a very progressive farmer and business man, and considered from the standpoint of his property holdings as well, and his consequent interest in county affairs, he is undoubtedly a well qualified man for the position. He becomes a candidate not because he needs the salary attached but through the insistence of those who believe that a heavy property holder is naturally more interested in the conduct of county affairs than one who has but little personal or real property. Mr. Wilson is well known in the city and in Hinman precinct, where he formerly resided.
