Local Attorneys Go to Washington.

Attorneys J. J. Halligan and W. V. Hoagland of this city, have been employed by the attorney general of the state to assist him in arguing the water right case before the United States supreme court. They will leave for Washington April 4th. The federal government claims that as it absolutely controls all navigable streams, it also controls the rivers which flow into and which are a part of these navigable streams, while the states contend that they control the rivers within their borders. This case is a very important one, as it affects more or less the water supply of all irrigated ditches in the west. Messrs. Halligan and Hoagland were selected by reason of the study they have made of state and federal control of water rights.
