Silo and Dairy Special.

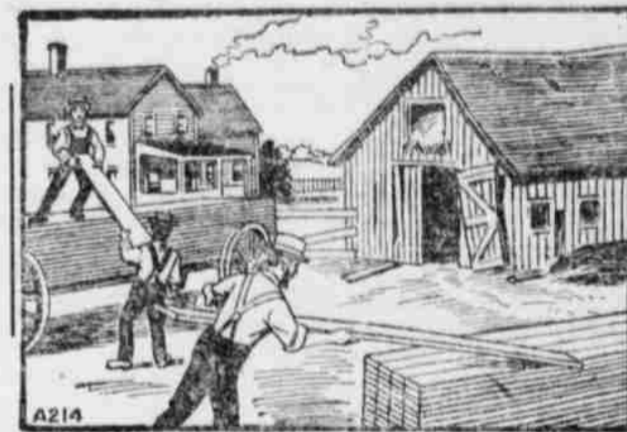
