### COUNCILMEN WILL MAKE PAVING INSPECTION TRIP.

The city council devoted a good part of its time at the Tuesday session to discussing street paving. Mayor Evans had written the officials of several Nebraska towns as to their experience with the different paving material, and he read the reply letters. From each town came word that - vetrified brick with asphalt filler have proven the most satisfactory and from none of these towns was concrete recommended. After discussing the proposition at length a motion was made that the council as a body visit Nebraska towns and thus personally inform themselves as to paving results. The council will ask that a committee representing the property owners in the district accompany them on this trip of inspection. The towns to be visited will be Fremont, York, Hastings, Grand Island and Kearney, and the time of the trip will be probably next week. In view of the change of opinion in regard to the class of material to be used in North Platte, these changes being from brick to concrete, we believe the council has taken the right step in making this trip. The local demand for concrete in the face of the fact that all towns heard from recommend brick, is sufficient evidence that a personal inspection is necessary. Certainly, if concrete is not the best material North Platte would be foolish to use it even though it be cheaper.

### GREEK SHOT BY A FELLOW COUNTRYMAN

Peter Andras, a Greek, employed as a section hand at Glenburnie, was brought to the City Hospital Tuesday night suffering from a gunshot wound in the right shoulder. While the wound is serious, the man is not in a critical condition, the wound having been promptly dressed and the gun wad and shot extracted.

The fellow who did the shooting was a fellow countryman. The two had engaged in a game of cards a night or two before and the winner demanded his money, but the loser refused. This created bad feeling between the two, and Tuesday evening when returning from work on a track car on which was a shot gun, the weapon was picked up by Andras' enemy and fired at close range, so close in fact that the wad from the shell lodged in Andras' shoulder in addition to a number of the shot.

Later in the evening Sheriff Salisbury was telephoned, who drove up to Glenburnie, but by that time the fellow who did the shooting had decamped, and so far his whereabouts has not been learned. Andras was brought to the City Hospital the same night.

### BIG MONEY PAID OUT FOR HOGS.

C. H. Walter was a very busy man Monday evening and Tuesday forenoon, not because he was a candidate for the republican nomination for county clerk, but on account of the large number of hogs he purchased. Between six o'clock Monday evening and twelve o'clock noon Tuesday he issued checks aggregating ten thousand dollars, which represented the payment for six hundred hogs which he handled within those hours. These hogs came largely from George Shoup, of Sutherland, and from the state experimental farm, and were sold to Mr. Walter instead of being shipped direct to South Omaha by the growers.
