RESULT IN THE COUNTY.

The returns from Lincoln county were very incomplete up to last evening, and on some of the candidates the result will not be known until the canvass of the votes is made. Returns from practically all the precincts are in, but in a number of cases those who brought in the returns did not keep a copy of the vote.

In thirty-four precincts out of the forty-six a reasonably accurate count was taken on the republican candidates but not much attention paid to the vote on the democratic candidates. These thirty-four precincts gave the following republican vote:

County clerk—Allen 752, Walter 463, Hoagland 263.
 County treasurer—Souder 939, Davis 459.
 Sheriff—Salisbury 988, Coker 252, Stegmann 102, Layton 88, McConnell 36.

The vote on the republican candidates for commissioner in the Third district is close between Fowler and Koch.

On the democratic side of the house there is a pretty race between Grant and Gibbs, with the latter a little ahead. For clerk of the district court Ware leads Dolan by a small margin, and for Sheriff Russell leads Waldo and Oulmette.

For governor McKelvie on the republican side leads Sutton and Neville has a nice majority over Bryan.

The official count will only tend to increase the majority or plurality of Allen, Souder and Salisbury. Heringhausen received a plurality of about 100 for democratic candidate for commissioner in the North Platte district.

Miss Gantt had no opposition for county superintendent, neither had Judge French, P. R. Halligan secured the republican nomination for county attorney, Geo. E. Prosser is the nominee of the same party for clerk of the district court and I. L. Miltonberger the nominee for commissioner from the First district.

DIRECTORS OUTLINE BUSY YEAR FOR THE C. OF C.

At the initial meeting of the new board of directors of the Chamber of Commerce held this week, a forecast of work for the coming year was made. Among the phases of the work considered was the employment of an experienced secretary who will devote all his time to the work.

Will make an effort to secure at least three state conventions for 1917. Mark at least two hundred and fifty miles of road and place fifty signs showing distances to North Platte.

Will assist the band financially. Help financially with the county fair and appoint a special committee to help in every way possible.

Have more booster trips. Will observe good roads day and will ask to business men to close for half a day and go out and assist the farmers.

Have a community picnic. Give a banquet to the farmers or arrange for a picnic at the experimental farm, inviting the farmers and their wives to be present.

Arrange for a "market week" or some kind of a celebration for the merchants.

Issue some booklets telling of North Platte and Lincoln county.

Boost for the cluster lights. Assist the park board and city council in every way in order that we may have a better, bigger and more prosperous North Platte.

A free employment bureau will be opened as soon as they employ a secretary. Here farmers, ranchmen and business men can secure help free and men wanting employment will be registered free of charge.
