### MILL AND ELEVATOR SOLD TO REYNOLDS

The North Platte mill and elevator, owned jointly by the Iddings estate and Leumer, has been sold to W. L. Reynolds, who for several years has lived north of town, where he owns several sections of land. The purchaser will take possession of the property May 1st, but whether he will operate the mill in the immediate future has not been learned.

The property has had somewhat of a checkered career since it was built over twenty-five years ago. It was, however, successfully operated by C. F. Iddings and last year run to its full capacity by the Lexington company pending the erection of its new mill.

The mill is equipped with the very best of machinery and has a capacity of 250 barrels per day.
