If there are other reasons for a rupture of relations with Germany than is contained in the subcommittee controversy, it should be made known. The American people are willing to confidently follow their president in his efforts to uphold the honor and dignity of their country and to maintain the efficiency of its government, everywhere on earth, but when it comes to a question of war or even a diplomatic rupture with another nation, they should know all the facts.

What, if anything, of vital moment is the president holding back that has to do with our relations with Germany?—Omaha Bee.

It has always been a mooted question as to "who struck Billy Patterson," but there is no question as to who struck Billy Bryan and brother Charley. Again it has been demonstrated that the fellows who hail from the "short grass" section of Nebraska not only fight strong but fight fair.

As the man largely responsible for releasing Nebraska democracy from the strangle hold of the Bryans, Keith Neville will probably receive more or less attention from editorial writers on the metropolitan dailies and the writers in current review magazines.

**AGRICULTURAL REVIVAL WILL BE HELD MAY THIRD**

Arrangements are being completed for an agricultural revival that will rival the Billy Sunday and Lowry meetings, at and about North Platte on May 3. This is to be a big awakening of interest in agricultural matters. While our farmers are readers of many agricultural papers, they are interested in meeting and hearing the men who are the leaders in agriculture throughout the country.

These meetings are for everybody old and young. The plan is to hold several school meetings in North Platte and in the country, one women's meeting in town, one farmers' meeting at school houses throughout the country adjacent to North Platte.

The special train will arrive in North Platte at 1:40 central time and the meetings will begin at 2:00 p. m. sharp and quit at 3 p. m. This will take the farmer from his work not more than one quarter of a day.

The subjects will be chosen to suit the request of the people in the neighborhood. The general line is live stock, silos and dairying.

Another Hold-Up on the U. P.

For the second time this month, a Union Pacific train was held up in Wyoming by one lone bandit, who is the same fellow who committed the first act. This second hold-up occurred Friday evening at nine o'clock near Hanna, and the nervy robber secured about four hundred dollars from the occupants of one car. The fellow got on the train at Greeley, Col., and when it reached a point west of Hanna he stuck his gun under the train guard's nose and commanded him to take his hat and gather up the money from the passengers which the guard did with alacrity while the bandit followed behind him. The bandit then proceeded to enter the car ahead, but just then the porter of that car opened the door, and as he stepped into the vestibule snapped the lock. The bandit passed by the porter, and as the latter entered the car he also snapped the lock, thus imprisoning the bandit in the vestibule. However, as the train neared a tunnel it slowed down to fifteen miles an hour, the bandit coolly opened the outside doors and jumped off.

The hold up was reported to Cheyenne when the train reached Ft. Steele, and a big posse of men sent out, and the following day he was overtaken about forty miles north of Laramie.

Since the first hold up on April 6th all passenger trains west out of Cheyenne have been provided with a heavily armed guard, but in this instance this provision availed nothing.

A few days previous to the robbery the bandit sent a watch chain to a Denver newspaper stating that it was among the booty he secured on train No. 1 on April 5th, and also stated that he would again make a hold-up. In this promise he made good.
