A LITTLE "JOKER" DEFEATS RESOLUTION

City Council Goes on Record as Opposed to Abolition of the Cigar Store Games

Until the people of North Platte provide a better class of amusement, the city council, by a vote of 19 to 12, went on record Tuesday evening as opposed to the abolition of the cigar games as played in the several cigar stores of the city.

Whereas, there is now no authority for the sale of intoxicating liquors within the city of North Platte, Nebraska, and whereas complaint has been made of violations of the law with reference to prostitutes within said city.

Therefore be it resolved, that the police of the said city, be and they hereby are, particularly directed and instructed to see that the law in regard to sales of intoxicating liquors, gambling and prostitution, as well as in all other regards, is strictly enforced.

On the face of it, the resolution appeared perfectly "good"; none of the councilmen were or are opposed to a strict enforcement of the law as regards illegal sale of liquor, houses of prostitution and gambling.

The defeat of the resolution does not necessarily deter any one who has moral courage and a stiff backbone from investigating the games, and if they come under the head of gambling, to file an information against the offenders.

Cows Must Have Good Care. "Not only is it necessary to have a cow for every home but it is equally necessary to have a home for every cow."

"The milk scale and the Babcock test are absolutely necessary to tell him what these cows are doing. He should set a standard of butter fat and milk production and everything that falls below it should be taken from the herd."

Wisconsin's best dairymen are setting their standards at 7,000 and 8,000 pounds of milk and 350 to 400 pounds of butter fat, and many of them even higher.
