WARE FOLLOWS ACTION OF PRESIDENT MOHLER.

Following the resignation of President Mohler last Thursday, came the resignation of General Manager Ware Saturday. In speaking of the resignation of Mr. Ware, the Omaha Bee said:

There is no stated time fixed for the resignation of Mr. Ware becoming effective. It asks that he be relieved from the duties of general manager of the Union Pacific at a time that will best suit the convenience of the road.

The general manager of the Union Pacific is a creature of the president and due to the fact that the resignation of President Mohler becomes effective July 1, next, it is more than likely that he will hold the whole matter in obedience, turning it over to his successor, who will make the appointment.

Although General Manager Ware asserts that he has had the resignation under consideration for some months, to his friends and to the railroad people it comes as a surprise. Asked why he resigned Mr. Ware said:

"There are two reasons for quitting the position. The first is that my physical and mental condition is good and I want it to remain so. The second reason is that I have been engaged in active railroad work for thirty years. I want to rest and I want to travel. I have nothing in view for the future, so far as business or employment is concerned. I am through with railroading. I leave the Union Pacific with the best of feeling toward its officials and employees, from the highest to the lowest. It is the best road that I know of and it and its people have treated me kindly. Omaha will continue to be my home."

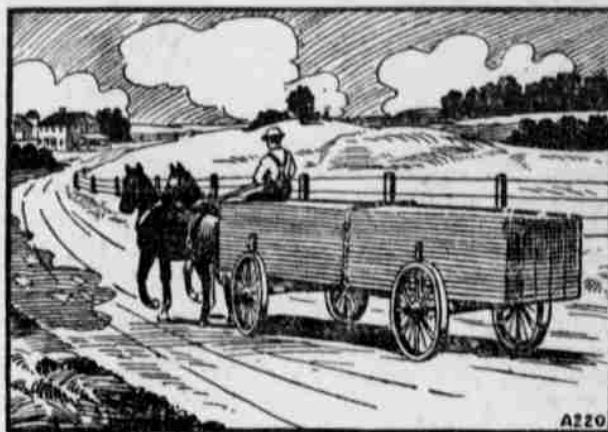
lot 4, block 2, Miller's addition from a valuation of \$720 to \$560, error in assessment.

Said petition reads as follows: Road to commence at northeast corner of section (32) twenty-two, township eleven (11), range thirty (30), running thence south on section line between sections 22 and 23, sections 26 and 27, sections

34 and 35, township 11, range 30, and between sections 2 and 3, sections 10 and 11, sections 14 and 15, sections 22 and 23, township 10, range 32, intersecting with road No. 136, and terminating thereat, said road being six and three-fourths miles in length and to be sixty-six feet in width. All damages having been waived by all the land owners and the board being of the opinion that said road is for the public good, grants the petition. Whereupon the board adjourns to May 23, 1916.

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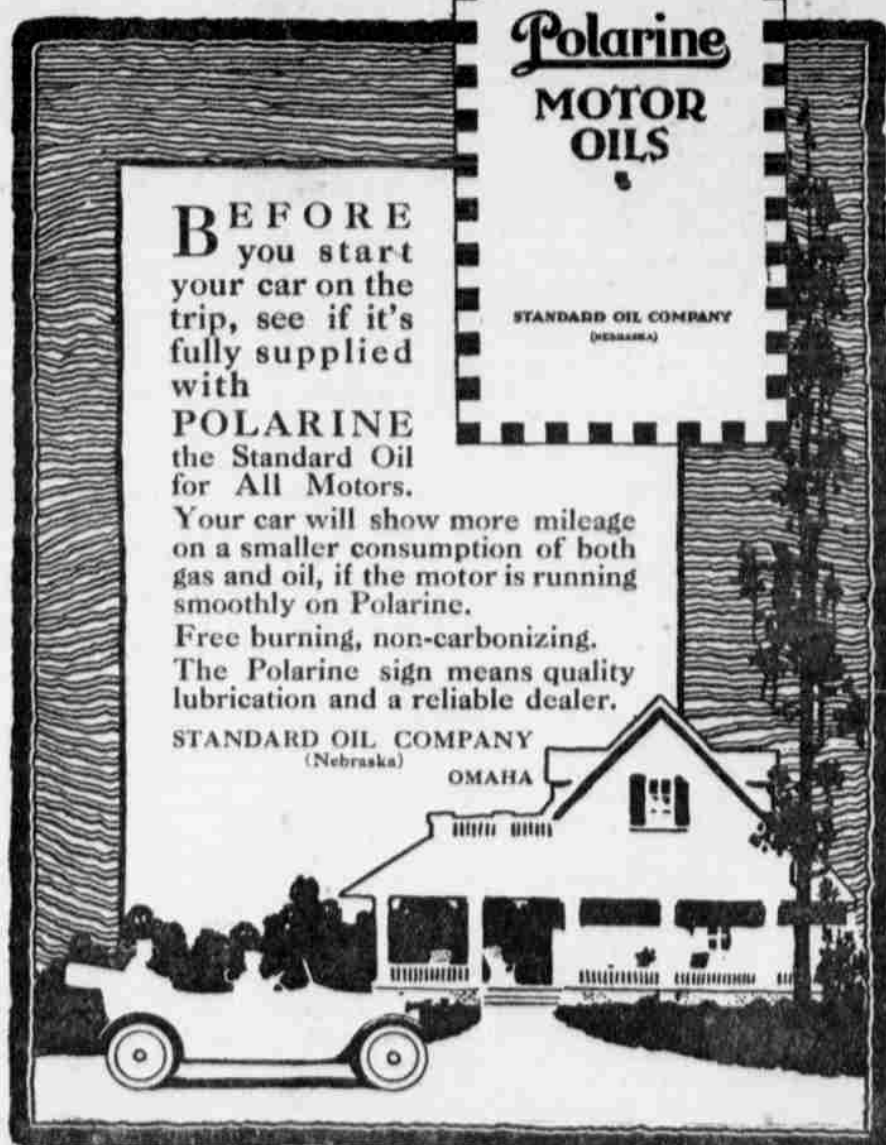
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
