**PICTURE OF NEW DEPOT  
NOW ON EXHIBITION**

While in town Wednesday evening Genl. Supt. Jeffers left with E. F. Seeburger, a photograph of the new Union Pacific depot as it will appear when completed. The picture has been framed, and placed on exhibition in the First National Bank. The building is 250 feet long and about seventy wide, the central part, which will contain the waiting rooms and offices, rising to a height of forty feet, with wings to the east and west, the former constituting the baggage room and the latter the dining room and lunch counter. The west end of the building will be a little east of the shield mound now in the park, and the entrance to the main part of the building will be opposite Pine street, or nearly so.

In the central portion of the building over the waiting room will be a balcony from which entrance will be had to the offices of the various terminal officials.

Mr. Jeffers stated that the estimated cost of the building complete is \$124,000.

**Cadets Go to Camp.**

Sixty out of the eighty high school cadets, with Prof. Redenbaugh as commandant, left yesterday morning for Gothenburg, where they will go into camp for five days, returning Monday evening. The camp is located on the North bank of Lake Helen, a very suitable site, with boating and bathing as an advantage and a rifle range near by. Ample tents were obtained from a Fremont firm, and these were set and the camp arranged by a detachment of the cadets who went down the preceding day.

Sunday will be reception day and if the weather is fair many North Platte people will visit camp.

**Installs Sand Pump**

Dave Scott is now installing on the North Platte river a short distance east of the bridge a sand pump which will be used in obtaining gravel for street paving. The sand is pumped from the bottom of the river and run over a screen, the finer particles dropping back into the river and the coarser landing on the bank.

It will require 5,000 yards of gravel for the paving district, for the delivery of which Mr. Scott has the contract. A large amount of sand will also be needed.

**New Bishop for Nebraska.**

At the session of the Methodist Episcopal convention at Saratoga Springs, N. Y., Wednesday night, Rev. Frank M. Bristol, who has been bishop of Nebraska, was assigned to Chattanooga, Tenn., and is succeeded by Bishop Homer Clyde Stuntz. The new bishop was born in Erie county, Pa., in 1868 and entered the ministry in 1884. He was a missionary in India from 1886 to 1895 and was made superintendent of the Methodist missions in the Philippine islands in 1901, and later was a bishop in the South American field.

Rev. Herbert Covell a former North Platte boy now pastor of an Episcopal parish in Brooklyn, N. Y., is visiting his mother and brother at the ranch north of town and his sister Mrs. Edmund Dickey.
